CORN SYRUP CORRECT NAME.

Washington, Feb. 14.—An important question in the administration of the food law was settled to-day in a decision made public by Secretaries Wilson, Courtelyou and Straus. It bears upon the labelling of syrup. The decision follows: "We have given careful consideration to the labelling of the thick viscous syrup obtained by the incomplete hydrolysis of the starch of corn and composed essentially of dextrose, maltose and extrine. In our opinion it is lawful to label this syrup as 'corn syrup,' and if to the corn syrup there is added a small percentage of refiner's syrup and mixture, in our judgment, is not misbranded if labelled corn 'syrup with cane flavor.'"
