It is meant for all those who opened their hearts to us, and fairly carried us over the rough places in the very arms of love. In these few words his mother and I are joined by his two aunts—his Auntie Grace—his Auntie Ede—who loved our little darling as their very own, and by all those who were bound to him by ties of blood and ties of love.

Medical Examination of School Children.

The idea of physical examination of school children to discover defects of the body is not new. It has been advocated by many educators. It is supported by a good many considerations. There are objections obvious which may be urged against it. But, on the whole, it is a proposition which appears to be worth trying. There is no doubt that many pupils in the schools have defective vision. Slowness in mental development is often due to this cause. Inattention and apparent carelessness toward instructions are not frequently shown to be due to defective hearing. The dull child is misjudged when nature is at fault. The same thing might be said of

her defects mentioned as worth consideration by examining physicians. The aim of the schools is to train youth from manhood and womanhood. The attention has been given to the mind far more than to the body. The sound mind in the sound body is the right ideal. If the two can be developed together the better will the foundations be laid for good citizenship in the coming years.

To carry out the plan proposed will require a staff of sane and prudent examiners. A considerable amount of money will be needed for their compensation and it is a question as to whether it can be obtained. But the benefit to the children would be so marked that the outlay would be well worth while. There is little reason to doubt that hearty co-operation of examiners, teachers, and parents would save many a growing boy and girl from suffering in after years due to neglect or carelessness during the school age.

REPUBLICAN SUCCESS.

There is a Good Outlook for Republican Success in Crawford This Year.

Owing to the hard rain on Friday last there was not a large attendance at the meeting of republican committeemen and other republicans, at Denison on that afternoon. Those who were present were enthusiastic over the outlook for the county giving a majority this fall for the republican party. With Taft the nominee and a promised continuance of the policies of Roosevelt it was considered that the thinking voters would with satisfaction endorse the republican ticket. There was a discussion as to many disputed points of the primary law which was participated in by Messrs. McHenry, Klinker, Kahler, Tucker, Mains, Chas. K. Meyers and others; It was the opinion that the county convention held after the primary would have power to fill all vacancies on the ticket caused by failure to get nomination paper to the auditor in time or failure to have a candidate for a particular office on the primary ticket through no one desiring to push himself for a given position.

RICKETTS ITEMS.


