RYAN ON RAILWAY CHICANERY

Declares 95 Per Cent of Stock watered up to 1885.

New York, April 23.—(Special.)—Thomas F. Ryan told the special county grand jury which investigated the Metropolitan street railroad that not a dollar had been paid originally for 95 per cent of the stock of the railroads of this country. Up to 1885 all but 5 percent of the railroad stock was water, as Mr. Ryan expressed it.

Mr. Ryan had read his formal statement about the organization of the Metropolitan from its inception, and concluded it with this remark:

"This is in answer to the statement that has been made for the last five years that the Metropolitan street railway stock is all water."

"Mr. Ryan," queried Mr. Jerome, "you have been connected with many corporate ventures, both in street railways and steam railways, have you not?"

"Yes sir," answered Mr. Ryan. Mr. Jerome wanted to know about the percentage of water in railroad stocks.

"Ninety-five per cent of the railroad stock of this country never cost a dollar," said Mr. Ryan. This made some of the jurors sit up.

"You mean that 95 per cent of the stock of railroads is water?" asked Mr. Jerome.

"We have had to put up stock in the last ten or twelve years. Since it is easy to raise money on stocks and bonds, but up to 1885-95 per cent of all the steam railroads and all the street railroads and all the industrial corporations in this country never put in \$1 in their stock, except a little of the organization expense required for a few shares of stock in the beginning," he declared.

"So your experience is," went on Mr. Jerome, "that \$33.50 paid in every \$100 in stock is exceptional?"

"Yes, sir," was Mr. Ryan's reply. Up to 1873 there was not a dollar paid in on the St. Paul, Northwestern, Omaha or any of those railroads."

"If you took stock in those roads as they stand today," continued Mr. Jerome, "including the roads that have been reorganized and are supposed to have been put on a sound basis, would \$33 in cash for every share of \$100 pay would that be a large percentage of cash?"

"A large percentage of them," said Mr. Ryan, "haven't had any-

thing. Not only that, in the re-organization that took place from 1900 to 1907 they assessed the stock and gave bonds."

"We understand, then," put in a juror, "that the roads only cost about 5 per cent of the capital issue. They were built with bonds?"

"They were built with bonds," replied Mr. Ryan. "The Union Pacific railroad was built with bonds and got a land grant worth \$250,000,000 from the government besides."

"And Atchison the same?" asked a juror.

"Atchison the same," concluded Mr. Ryan.
