The following notice of the death of Mrs. Henry C. Morris will be of interest to many readers:

Mary L. Burnham was born in Portage, Wyoming county, N. Y., November 29, 1844, and died in her home near Calumet, April 11, 1908. After a brief illness, heart disease, with which she had been troubled for a number of years, finally claimed her as its victim. She moved in early childhood, with her grand parents to Kewanee, Ill. At the age of 14 years she united with the Baptist church.

April 12, 1865 she was united in marriage to Henry C. Morris, at Toulon, Ill. They moved to Crawford county, Ia., April 27, 1865. March 13, 1892, they moved to Archer City, Texas. They moved to Oklahoma in 1899, where they resided up to the time of her death.

There were born to them 9 children all of whom are living, except one son, who preceded her nine years ago. The funeral services were conducted Sunday, April 12, 1908, at 3 o'clock p. m. at the Red Rock M. E. church, by Rev. T. E. Carter of the First M. E. church of El Reno, who spoke from the 39th Psalm. Afterward the remains were laid to rest in the beautiful Red Rock cemetery, near her son and grand daughter. She was a loving wife and mother and a kind neighbor. She leaves a husband, eight children and a host of friends to mourn her loss.
