### CHARLES SEGBART ANSWERS THE FINAL CALL.

It was a surprise to the residents of this community to learn of the death of Charley Segbart, who resides north of town. Mr. Segbart was a loving father and a kind husband but not only will be missed by his family but by all his neighbors for he was a man greatly loved by all he knew. Charley Segbart was born the 11th of March, 1856 in Arenshagen, Pomerania, Germany, when 7 years old his parent emigrated to America and settled in Chicago where they lived for a time. In 1872 they moved to Carroll county and from there to Crawford county. In 83 he was married to Anna Bands. Mr. Segbart worked in South Chicago thirteen years. He then bought his father's farm where he lived until his death. Death came Wednesday May 27, after suffering for a short time with typhoid pneumonia. Funeral services were conducted at the residence Friday and interment in the Hays township cemetery. Mr. Segbart leaves a widow and six children an aged mother and other relatives to mourn his death. We extend our sympathy to the mourners in their hour of sorrow.

### DIES IN HOSPITAL AT COUNCIL BLUFFS.

News reached here Saturday morning, from Council Bluffs, announcing the death of Mrs. Steffin there in the hospital. In her death a loving mother and faithful neighbor enters the better world. Mrs. Christina Steffin was born in Oldberg, Germany, March 18, 1827. She was united in marriage to Chas. Steffin about 53 years ago and together they came to America in 1871 and settled in Illinois. Twenty-five years ago they moved to Iowa and have made their home in this state ever since. The husband died in 1900. To them were born six children four of whom are still living and two have preceded her to the better country. For about three years she has been a constant sufferer and on Friday, May 22, she was taken to the hospital in Council Bluffs, where just one week afterwards, May 29, the release from her pain and anguish came and she entered the world eternal. The funeral services were conducted by Rev. M. M. Cable of the M. E. church of this city at the Astor church and the remains were laid to rest in the cemetery at Astor. The relatives have the sympathy of the whole community in their home of sorrow.
