Teachers Being Entertained and Amused at County Expense.

The up-to-date institute for teachers is not like the ones held in the good old days. Now, examinations are held before the institute, and the sessions are devoted to hearing lectures from distinguished men. In the days of old, institute lasted two and three weeks, and instruction was given, recitations heard, and at the end, examinations held. Of course the first method is best liked by the superintendent who thus only has one week of institute, by the lecturers who earn money going from place to place, and lastly by the teachers who do not have to spend much board, money and need not labor any harder than they like, for the certificate does not depend on institute work done. There was a chalk talk on Wednesday evening. Prof. Storms of Ames speaks Friday night and on Saturday morning Prof. Ott gives his famous lecture on "Sour Grapes." The public is invited to all lectures. Prof. Fellows and President Van Ness are among the working force.
