Aug. 23. Friendship of David and Jonathan. I Sam. 20:30-42

The lesson for this date is most pleasing to study. Nothing is more beautiful than true love and friendship, and in the case of the friendship of Jonathan for David it was most remarkable. Jonathan was the son of Saul. While the father looked with envy and hate on the growing popularity of David, the son was pleased with it, although it meant that he should not succeed his father to the throne. The record says that when David came back from killing Goliath and reported himself to the king that the soul of Jonathan was knit with the soul of David and that Jonathan went so far as to take his robe from off himself and to hand it and his bow and sword, to David.

Jonathan became the fast friend and defender of David. He informed him that Saul hated him so that he had best not come into his presence. In the lesson of to-day Jonathan warned David to fly from Saul. Before he went, they renewed their covenant of friendship, and David promised that he would care for Jonathan and his family if the opportunity came at anytime to do so. GARRISON RUNS MARRIAGE BUREAU

DENISON BOY MAKES SENSATION IN THE CANAL ZONE.

IS CALLED THE "JAIL JUDGE"

But His Methods Cause a Wedding Epidemic Among the Negro Laborers.

The Council Bluffs Nonpareil beat the Denison papers in getting an interview out of Judge E. S. Garrison, while here visiting his parents. Edgar is so quiet about it that we did not think he had such a story up his sleeve as the bright Nonpareil reporter succeeded in extracting. We acknowledge the corn and reprint from the Nonpareil as follows:

Council Bluffs Nonpareil - Special: Edgar S. Garrison, judge of the district court of the canal zone, isthmus of Panama, who enjoys the unique record of having caused 258 marriages in five days, and of having performed forty-six civil marriage ceremonies in a period of forty-five minutes, was in Council Bluffs today. The judge is visiting at his old home in Logan, where for six years he was clerk of the district court. He left Empire, his place of residence in the canal zone, July 21, and is due to return there September 1.

News of Judge Garrison's manner of revolutionizing court practices had preceded his return home, and his record there is pleasing to his many friends in Iowa. Before he was appointed to the bench it had been the custom merely to fine men and women convicted of immoral conduct, and money being plentiful replenished the government's treasury but had no effect upon the morals of the community.

"One morning," remarked Judge Garrison, with not the least indication of a desire to pose as a moralist or worker of revolutionary practices, "eleven couples captured in a raid the night before, were brought before me, one at a time.

"Guilty or not guilty," I asked the first, after stating the charge. "Guilty, was the nonchalant reply. "I called up the next one. "Are you guilty too?" I inquired. "Oh, yes, came the answer promptly enough.

Fools the Culprits.

"It was the same plea all the way down the line. They had been accustomed to paying fines of \$5 each, but this time they were disappointed.

"I called up again the women who had little children and fined them \$17.50 apiece and made the men pay the fines. Then I sentenced every one of the others to a week in jail.

"It did not take long for the news to spread. Processions of wedding gowns came from every direction to the court room. During the following five days I married 253 couples. On one occasion I had two other men fill out the certificates, while I simply signed them and performed the legal ceremonies. I married forty-six couples in forty-five minutes.

"When are you going down to the court house?" I was asked by the foreman of a big establishment. Two of my niggers came to me this afternoon and each of them asked me: "Boss, can ah get half an hour off this afternoon." Aeh wants to get married." I never heard of such a thing.

"Of course they were all colored people who got married in that way. They certainly formed a picturesque crowd. I did not charge anything for performing the ceremonies, I couldn't very well do so when I was partly the cause of the stampede.

Had Married 700 Couples.

"From January 1st to the time I left Empire I had married 700 couples, and the colored population is still getting married. In Empire 2,700 of the 3,700 people are colored."

"The jail judge" is the title which the people of the place have placed upon Judge Garrison's head because of his imposing jail sentences instead

of fines. When Secretary Taft visited the zone, says the judge, the secretary was presented with a petition, signed unanimously by the negroes, asking him to remove Judge Garrison. "In addition to the ordinary colored people there are in the canal zone," said the judge, "hundreds of tropical bums who naturally cause a great deal of trouble and who are brought into court on various minor charges.

Unique Court Incident.

"A great many of the colored people are ready to offer testimony voluntarily, but as their testimony is pretty unreliable I have tried to discourage it. Generally, if I keep a witness on the stand long enough for him to tangle himself up, he does not offer any more testimony in court.

"On one occasion a man and woman swore that they were brother and sister. I sent the man out in the hall in charge of an officer.

"How may brothers and sisters have you? I asked the woman. "Six brothers and three sisters," she replied.

"What are the names of your father and your mother?" She gave them.

"Then I called in the man. "How may brothers have you?" I asked.

"None." "How many sisters?" "One."

"What are the names of your father and your mother?" "I do not know."

"That is a fair sample of the sort of testimony referred to."

There are five district judges in the zone whose duties are similar to those of a police magistrate in the United States.

The Review Stands Fifth.

These are the Jefferson Bee, the Manchester News, the Sigourney News and the Traer Star-Clipper. Photographing the Stomach.

A new apparatus has been devised by a physician in Munich, by which the inside of the stomach can be clearly photographed. The camera is actually swallowed by the patient, and when it reaches its destination the interior of the stomach is illuminated by a small electric lamp attached to the apparatus. At the bottom of the camera is wound a photographic film 20 in. long and one-fourth of an inch wide. The physician can pull a cord which runs the film past the lens, the electric lamp is turned on, and the impression is made on the sensitive film. This procedure is repeated until the requisite number of pictures have been taken. -From September number of Popular Mechanics.
