Sunday School Column

Side Lights on Next Sunday's Lesson for Teachers and Pupils.

Aug. 30. David Spares Saul's Life. 1 Sam. 26:17-25.

A study of the lesson for this day will show that far back, over one thousand years before Christ was born, one of the leading commands of His Sermon on the Mount, was given practically demonstration. It was this: "Love your enemies; do good to them who hate you." Our lesson of last week, where we learned of the friendship of Jonathan in warning David of Saul's deadly hatred for him, has prepared us for the lesson of today. Those who have read in the bible about the life of David prior to becoming king will know that Saul sought his life, chasing him about in the mountains, and trying to spy out his hiding places. Saul even went so far as to kill a priest who had given David food when he was in desperate need of something to eat. With this in mind let us look at the lesson verses.

There are two recorded instances when David spared the life of Saul. One is found in the 24th chapter of 1 Sam. and the other in the 26 chapter, the lesson of this date. In the first instance David had sought hiding from Saul in a huge cave, when what should happen, but that Saul should come and lay himself for sleep near the mouth of the cave. The soldiers with David, whispered to him, that thus had God put his enemy in his power.

David refused to do any violence to the sleeping king. He did cut off part of his garment to show him that he could have killed him if he had so wished. The lesson of this date records how when Saul was sleeping, David and a servant, went to the prostrate king, took the cruse of water near him, and his spear. At this time David was urged by his men to take the life of Saul, when in his power to do so.

After the securing of the spear, David from safe distance had a talk with Saul, and told him that he was innocent of desiring to do him harm. Saul was overcome by this conduct on the part of David and said he had sinned, played the fool and erred exceedingly. He ended up by blessing David and turning back from following him with evil intent.

There are few commands in the bible which so go counter to the nature of man, as the one to love his enemies and do good to those who hate him. In rare cases the natural man, with no knowledge of the teachings of the bible has been magnanimous and done good to his arch enemy, but the usual way, of slaying, when the offending one is in helpless condition, is usually followed. The religion of Jesus is the religion of love, and to be true christians we must follow lines of conduct inspired by love. The great Apostle Paul says in Romans 12: 21, "Be not overcome of evil, but overcome evil with good", and this should be the feeling and aim of every follower of Jesus. One's bitterest enemy can be made a friend by a display of love. Hatred and desire for revenge does not give true happiness. The men and women you most admire are not those living to punish their enemies, but rather those who shed sunshine and love on their daily paths. We hope that the study of this lesson will result in a new determination to guide the life by rules of love, for all know that hatred, revenge malice, must be distasteful to God and those who indulge in these cannot be in His full favor.

LAND AT \$110 AN ACRE

History of a Well Known German Farmer Called to Mind.

Among the recent real estate deals in the county, is the purchase of 120 acres in Charter Oak township by Mr. Nicholas Lafrantz, of Denison. The land is three miles west of Charter Oak town in the north part of section 32 and owned by C. Radmacher. It is the first bench land of the Soldier Valley, and the price was \$110 per acre. He had land in the valley offered for \$55 but the Radmacher land better suited him and his son Albert, and so the purchase was made. This reminds us that Nicholas Lafrantz was one of the pioneer Germans of Crawford county. He came by prairie schooner to Crawford in 1868, hailing from Scott county. The land in Greene, and Carroll was wet when he came through, and so he drove further west to the hill lands of Crawford. He spent his first night in this county in his wagon at Dunham's grove. Coming to Denison he decided to locate in the county and ran in debt for a small piece of land in Otter Creek township buying through J. W. Denison. About him, in time grouped Germans who have made fortunes in sheep raising, cattle, hogs, and grain, and to this added the rise in value of the land. His neighbors were H. H. Lehfeldt, C. F. Schwartz, John C. Moiler, C. F. Schmidt, John Reimers, R. Lehfeldt, and others. Mr. Lafrantz kept at work, bought more land and has now retired to Denison residing on the corner south of the court house. His children have grown up to honor him, and are on the farms of this county. His capable worthy daughter, Mrs. Annie Hollander, is now the mistress of the fine large home of Henry Schwartz, which she and her husband recently bought. If Mr. Lafrantz paid \$110 for the Charter Oak farm it was worth that money, for he is a judge. He is one of the Germans who has made north Crawford like a garden spot, and in turn benefited by her fertile soil and never failing crops.

CROPS IN FT. YATES NORTH DAK.

Robert Bauman Writes His People as to Crops and Grains Raised on Indian Reservation in North Dakota.

As is known to many, Robert, son of Wm. Bauman and wife, is now connected with the government Indian work in North Dakota having been transferred from similar work in Oklahoma and given a raise in salary at the same time. His recent letter home has certain information which will be interesting to our readers and Mr. Bauman has kindly let us print the following:

M. K. Agricultural School, Ft. Yates, N. Dak., Aug. 5, 1908.

Dearest Parents:—

I now again take the pleasant task of writing a few lines to you to let you know that everything is going very nicely with us at the "Farm School" as it is commonly called in this vicinity. The harvest is just now upon us and today we have been rigging up the binder and preparing to make a break at the grain. I presume you have by this time all cut and stacked. It seems to be that I am going from one extreme to the other. When I left Oklahoma the harvest was just beginning and everything compared with home was so much earlier, and now here we are again just beginning harvest and everything is so much later than at home. It only goes to prove the great difference and the great distance existing between different parts of the great United States. I believe that I told you in a previous letter of the few days of hot winds that struck us some time ago. It made itself felt to quite an extent in the small grain and more especially in the wheat and speltz.

Speltz is no doubt a new name in the grain line for you, it is I am sure for me. This is the first time I have seen it grow. It looks like a cross between the wheat and barley and still retains the beards. That is the most disagreeable quality for they say that it is especially a dry country product and will flourish quite well and is very productive where nothing else will grow in this section. It is used mostly as a feed for stock and is very good for that purpose. Our oats has stood the racket better than anything else of the grain and although the grain will have a short straw it will yield pretty well. We expect to get about 1200 bushels of oats. This is not so bad and will help out in the feed question to a great extent.

Our field corn is just tasseling out and earing out and I am willing to bet that although perhaps your corn may be earlier yet you have not a field that would compare with ours in appearance. It is very fine and if only the frost stays off for a reasonable time we are having expectations of making a showing that will attract attention of all that drive the road this way. Thus we show the Indians by example what can be done in the farming line and that is generally the best kind of preaching. This is naturally a potato country and we have a couple of fields which beat anything that I have seen for many a year.
