### STRUCK BY THE ENGINE THEY WILL MOVE TO IDAHO.

#### A Man Nearly Killed at Denison Station Last Thursday Night.

Walter Schledgeger, a farm hand was struck by the engine of the train going west at 9:20 last Thursday evening and his leg broken in two places and head and back injured. He was taken to the hospital the leg set and he is doing well. Last Thursday evening seemed freighted with railroad accidents. Residents of Denison rushing to catch the train to go to Arion on account of the death of Mrs. Cummings came in contact with another railway mishap at the station, and saw a large man come into the depot hit by the cruel pilot of the engine. It was thought that he had been killed. The unfortunate one was a man who recently came from Switzerland, and secured work with Jack Ahrlart on the farm south of Dow City. He and companions had come to Denison attracted by the circus. He had his return ticket and was following the crowd to the south side of the tracks to board the incoming train. He stopped on the track, some say to light a cigar. Spectators saw the danger and turned so not to see him ground under the wheels. He was not killed but his right leg was broken and his head and back injured. He was carried to the depot and in time surgeons look him in charge conveying him to the hospital. He is on the road to recovery.
