

CLAUS JOHN HOLLING DEAD

A PIONEER GERMAN DIES AT ASPINWALL SEPTEMBER FIFTEENTH.

WAS WELL KNOWN IN COUNTY German and English School Master, Business Man and Public Official.

On Tuesday morning, Sept. 15 about 3:30 occurred the death of C. J. Holling at his late home in Aspinwall. Death came as a relief after a lingering illness of complicated diseases since February. Claus John Holling was born in Henstedt, Schleswig, Holstein, June 3, 1830. He came to this country in 1850 at the age of 20 and settled near Long Grove, Scott county. Two years later he was married to Augusta Rasmussen. After residing at Long Grove for twenty-three years he came west in 1875 and settled on the quarter section of land adjoining the present town of Schleswig on the east. In the spring of 1883 he sold the furniture and undertaking business at Vail, which business he conducted six years. Disposing of it in 1889 he moved back near his old homestead, which was about twelve miles north-west of Denison and went to teaching school. He had also taught school eight years before this, during his previous residence on the farm. He taught in both the English and German language and many of the young men and women of the German settlement can tell of their tutor-

ship. With the exception of the last year and for the past fifteen years he was postmaster at Aspinwall. In the numerous positions of trust which he held during his life he was counted strictly honest, always accurate and prompt. He was a strenuous man with a strong will power. He was generous and always willing to help others who were in distress, and a devoted Christian. Rev. H. E. Hansen, of Schleswig preached the funeral sermon at Aspinwall Thursday morning at 7:30. The funeral was largely attended by old acquaintances and friends and the remains were taken across the country to the Nisson cemetery, where three children are buried, who preceded him to the better world. Two other children are buried at Long Grove. He leaves a devoted wife to mourn his loss and one daughter, Mrs. D. P. Robertson of Manilla, eight grandchildren and one great grandchild. A nephew living near Moline, Ill. is the only person living having that name, Claus John Holling. The floral tributes were many—profuse and beautiful, which goes to show the high esteem in which he was held. He will be long remembered for he was one of the strong Germans of this county. The family return thanks to the friends who helped in the trying months prior to his death and at the funeral.

OHIO UNDERHILL DEAD.

Former Arion Merchant Dies in Omaha From Spinal Meningitis.

Ohio Merifield Underhill died at his home in Omaha, 3220 N. Twelfth Street, September 16, 1908. He was born August 21st, 1865, in Holmer Co. Ohio. He with his parents moved to Crawford County when he was six years old. He was married Oct. 2nd 1889 to Miss Sarah Wheeler of Dunlap, Iowa. Mr. Underhill was engaged in the mercantile business with his father, N. P. Underhill and brother Chas. at Arion Iowa and remained here for three years. Owing to his health he sold out his interest in the store here and engaged in the work of traveling salesman for a Chicago shoe firm. In this work he was very successful and remained in it for seven years, owing to impaired health he retired from this work, and after two years rest he engaged in the real estate business in Omaha, where he was again successful, until he was stricken with brain fever which was complicated with spinal meningitis and succumbed to this disease after a few days illness. When a boy on the farm in Willow Twp. he was respected and loved by all of his neighbors and when he engaged in the mercantile business in Arion he was admired for his honesty and integrity. When he united with the M. E. church in this place he was honored because of his Christian spirit which was manifest in his every day life. He was one who could see the good traits in his friends and had charity for those with their faults. He is survived by father, wife, two children, Lottie and Garret, two brothers, Chas. W. and Ira of Omaha. The funeral services were held in the Trinity M. E. church of Omaha and the remains laid to rest in the Dunlap cemetery by the side of his mother, who preceded him only a few months previous. The floral offerings were beautiful. Many Arion friends also neighbors and old friends from Willow twp. attended the services in Dunlap last Friday.
