DO NOT MISS HEARING THEM

Prof. Fellows Appeals to Denison People to Turn Out.

Educators of national reputation are our guests this week. Each one has a message. I can heartily recommend that all mothers of little children hear Miss Hoton's talk on Story Telling. All parents will find interest and profit in Dr. Starbuck's "An Interpretation of the 'Teens'" and his lecture on "The Neglected Nine-tenths of Life" should be heard by all. Dr. Thompson's lecture on "The Present Status of Moral Training in our Public Schools" can hardly be of less interest to parents than to teachers. Dr. James P. Haney has more than a national reputation as a Supervisor of Manual Training and Art Instruction. He is now just back from Germany where he has been in attendance at a big convention. His two lectures will be of interest to all thinking people.

All who are at all interested in the question of consolidation of schools should hear what Professor J. Stanley Brown of the big Joliet Township high school, has to say about township high schools in Illinois. While I do not know anything about what ideas Dr. Jenkin Lloyd Jones will present, I know that he is a man of virile and original thought and an eloquent speaker and that he will have a message that will be well worth hearing. He always draws a crowd in communities that know him. Dr. Bolton will explain the provisions of the forthcoming report of the Educational Commission appointed to revise the school laws of Iowa. This report will be presented to the next General Assembly for its adoption or rejection. It embodies some radical changes and will be of great interest to all who are interested in Iowa school legislation, and that ought to mean every one. State Supt. Riggs will speak on one phase of this report.

President H. H. Seerley always has a message of inspiration. All young people who are expecting to teach should hear him. The teachers would be glad if every one could hear him. Professor A. V. Storm of the Iowa State College will present work in Argiculture that can be done in the public schools. After all, what great questions in education are there that are of less interest to parents than to teachers? I heartily commend this program to all Denison people of high school age or above.

A BASE BALL ACCOUNTING

Notice to Members of the Denison Base Ball Association.

A meeting of the Denison Base Ball Association was called for last Thursday night for the purpose of hearing the report of the treasurer and to talk over the method of making up the shortage and paying the five bills outstanding against the association. As usual there was no one present except the officers of the association and consequently nothing could be done. When the list for donation was circulated last spring it called for four months, May, June, July and August, but owing to the fact that there was more or less complaint when the collector made the rounds the manager deemed it advisable to let the fourth collection go and attempt to pay out without it, consequently a two days' tournament was arranged for upon exceptionally favorable terms for the association, but the attendance and support given the tournament was so poor it only added to the already small indebtedness and the present statement shows the association in debt to the amount of about \$60.00.

Since there is no interest taken by anyone to provide a means of paying this indebtedness, the officers of the association see no other way out of it than to send a collector around for the last monthly payment, therefore sometime the last of this week the collector will call upon those who have subscribed.
