buck endeavored to give an "Interpretation of the 'Teens.'" At the period in a person's life known as the "teens" a great change takes place both physical and mental, and at this time many students formerly bright and capable, become dull and apparently stupid. This condition should not be regarded as an indication of mental weakness but only as a part of the natural growth. At this time the body makes remarkable growth and of necessity the mental activities slacken their pace. The child wisely directed at this time will pass on into the higher stage of development a strong, healthy student. Unwisely treated he will drift out of school and into the vast army of the uneducated. At this period of life comes also what is termed the waking of the soul to a consciousness of its possibilities—a time when the youth says within himself "Henceforth I am to be a man."

It must be a wise teacher who sees and understands these changes in the student and meets his requirements with just the right food for a new born soul. One of the speaker's main thoughts was that any sane teacher will naturally be full of the subject which he teaches, but above and beyond that he should be filled with a large self and his personality should so fill the child that instead of being conscious that he is being taught history etc., he may realize that he is being filled with the power to be a man. To the student of psychology Dr. Starbuck's talks were a delight, and to any who have neglected this important subject they could not fail to be helpful in creating a desire to study into the profound depths of the human soul that great and noble men and women may be the product of our schools.
