

IOWA 40,000 FOR REPUBLICANS.

Plurality Not So Large As in Previous Election.

MAJOR LACEY SNOWED UNDER.

Cummins Carries Senatorial Primary by 40,000—Indications Are That Jamieson Has Defeated Hepburn for Congress in Eighth District.

Des Moines, Nov. 4.—Late returns indicate that Taft has carried Iowa by a plurality of 40,000. This is a tremendous falling off from the Roosevelt plurality of 158,000 of four years ago, but it represents only a slight falling off from the normal plurality. The entire Republican state ticket is elected by about the same plurality. Governor A. B. Cummins probably carried the Republican senatorial primary over Major J. F. Lacey by a plurality of 40,000 a tremendous gain from last June, when he was defeated by Allison by 11,000.

There is a close race in the Sixth district between Hamilton, present incumbent, Democratic, and Kendall, Republican. Both sides are claiming the district. In the Second and First, close districts, Dawson and Kennedy, Republicans, are elected by safe pluralities. Returns from two-thirds of the Eighth district indicate that Jamieson has defeated Hepburn. In Des Moines there was a big loss of votes to the Republicans, due to the large labor vote for Bryan. Hull, in the Seventh district, was elected, but by a reduced plurality.

Illinois.
Chicago, Nov. 4.—Late returns showed conclusively that Taft had carried the state by 170,000. Deneen, the Republican candidate for governor, was elected by a plurality estimated at from 40,000 to 65,000. The next legislature, which is to choose a successor to United States Senator Albert G. Hopkins, will be composed of 58 Republicans and 176 Democrats in the house. The congressional delegation from Illinois, with three districts yet to hear from, will be composed of seventeen Republicans and five Democrats.



CONNECTICUT IN G. O. P. LIST.
Republicans Carry State by Increased Majority.

New Haven, Conn., Nov. 4.—The great size of the Republican victory in Connecticut yesterday was evident this morning when William H. Taft was found to have a plurality of 28,459. Debs polled 2,804 and Chaffin, the Prohibitionist, 2,280.

The plurality for governor of Mr. Lilley, against whom a great fight was waged, was 16,094 over Judge A. Heaton Robertson, his Democratic opponent.

The leaders of both parties in the state expressed great interest in the growth of the Socialist vote.

Missouri Is Democratic.

Kansas City, Nov. 4.—Returns from nearly every county in Missouri point to a plurality of at least 30,000 for Bryan, the election of the Democratic state ticket by a smaller plurality, Cowherd, Democrat, for governor, running some thousands below the remainder of the ticket; the defeat of Governor Folk by United States Senator William J. Stone in the Democratic balloting for United States senator, and the election of a congressional delegation of unchanged political complexion, a Democratic gain of one seat being offset by the loss of another seat.

G. O. P. Wins in Idaho.

Boise, Ida., Nov. 4.—Idaho has gone Republican on both state and national issues. James H. Brady has been elected governor.

CRAWFORD CO. STILL IN FLORIDA

KLINKER AND MCHENRY THE ONLY REPUBLICANS ELECTED ON THE COUNTY TICKET.

JOHN CAREY HAS CLOSE SHAVE.

Klinker Fairly Buries Richardson Under an Avalanche of Votes. Cummins Gains Sweeping Victory for Sheriff.

The story of two years ago was repeated in the county election yesterday. Klinker and McHenry are the only republican winners. The democratic majorities will range all the way from nearly a thousand for Cummins to a measly hundred for the great John Carey. Just as two years ago, the republicans sought a victim and found it in Randall, as they did then in Johnson. In fact the republicans knifed and slashed their ticket all along the line. The republicans of this county do not deserve success and they will not have it until they learn to stand by their ticket.

Gustav Buesing gave the redoubtable John Carey a close race and John looks as if he had had a spanking instead of an election. A week ago John thought he was going to lead the democratic ticket in the county and it is a severe blow to his pride to run about the poorest on the entire democratic ticket. He lays some of the blame to John Cook who openly worked against him. Mr. Buesing made but little effort and did not expect to be elected. Had he made a strong fight he would have been beaten worse, as then the republicans would have thought to scratch him as they did Randall. The election table tells the story of the election and the returns are nearly all in. Thus, Carey made a great run in Manilla out the movement towards him was not general enough to bring success. Otto Huebner also made a gallant run, getting a fine vote in Hanover. Klinker adds the fourth scalp to his belt today, having defeated in turn O'Hare, O'Connor, Shaw Van, Richardson. Klinker is the best campaign-

er the republicans of the county have ever had.

In Denison more interest was taken in rewarding Cummins for all that he has done for Crawford county than in electing the county ticket. The returns throughout the county on the primary are very meagre but Lacey will have about the same majority the Allison men had when the votes are all counted.

Woods for Congress will have about the same majority given the state ticket, showing that Crawford county republicans realized the importance of having a republican congress.

The returns were received at the opera house, at the Johnson drug store and at the commercial club rooms. The first reports were that the Tribune conceded New York to Bryan by 40,000 and the republicans were about the bluest lot ever seen. Later the returns came in better and better and the Taft men wore a smile that no defeat in county politics could remove.

The result of the county election is disappointing from a party standpoint. The men elected however are competent and the interests of the county will not suffer.

The result of the National election means four more years of good times and democrats as well as republicans breathe easier as they feel that prosperity is assured.

GUARDIAN FOR MR. LANG

The District Court Appoints M. E. Jones as Denison Guardian.

Judge Powers has named M. E. Jones, cashier of the Crawford County Bank, as guardian of the property of Mr. Lang, Sr., of Willow township. It was first rumored that the guardianship of his son would continue, but on advice of attorneys and to have the guardian some one toward whom the ward had no prejudice, Mr. Jones was appointed. He is a clean, honorable business man and will be fair in his dealings. Mr. Jones has had a number of conferences with Mr. Lang and they begin their relations in a friendly way. It is to be hoped for all concerned that the courts will not have again to go over the family troubles of Mr. Lang.

TAFT WINS GREAT VICTORY

SWEEPS THE NORTH AND SOME BORDER STATES.

TAFT CARRIES GREATER N. Y.

Congress Safely Republican—Cannon Re-elected—Cummins Wins For Senator in Iowa.

Taft has been elected president of the United States, according to the returns at the time of going to press, by a vote of 311 to 172 in the electoral college, thus giving him a clear majority over Mr. Bryan of 139.

Taft has carried every doubtful state in the east and west, including New York, Ohio, Indiana, Maryland, and some of the far western states, but not including Nebraska, which seems to have gone for Bryan.

His majority in New York state may reach 200,000, he carried Ohio by nearly 100,000, and Illinois by 17,000. Indiana was extremely close, the majority there for the head of the ticket ranging from 5,000 to 15,000, according to the returns at this time.

The returns now indicate that the far western mountain states of Colorado and Idaho have also given Taft their electoral votes, but these returns may be changed by later figures.

In New York state Gov. Hughes has been successful by a majority approximating 60,000 at the least. He ran largely ahead up the state, and the vote for Chanler in Greater New York was much smaller than was anticipated, while Bryan in the metropolis scarcely equaled the vote of Taft.

Hughes carried New York by a majority less than half as great as that of the presidential candidate. In Ohio there is serious question as to whether Harmon or Harris has won with the chances favoring Harris on account of the large majority for Taft.

In Indiana the democratic candidate for governor has probably been elected, and there is a possibility that the legislature is democratic also, thus involving the transfer of the seat

in the United States senate, now held by Mr. Hemenway.

In Minnesota, where there was a bitter fight for governor, Johnson seems to have won by a small majority, although Bryan was beaten in the state by considerably over 60,000 votes.

Missouri has gone for Bryan, as was expected. Hadley, the republican candidate for governor, made a hard fight, but could not overcome the normal democratic majority. The indications are that Senator Stone has succeeded in the primary election thus defeating the ambition of Gov. Folk to become United States senator.

Iowa has gone overwhelmingly for Taft, but by 80,000 majority. The returns from the primaries so far as received indicate that Gov. Cummins has received a majority of the republican vote and will therefore be indicated as the choice of the legislature for United States senator to succeed the late William B. Allison.

In Illinois Gov. Deneen has achieved an extraordinary triumph.

President Taft will be supported by a congress that will be republican in both branches. The House of Representatives will stand 215 republican and 176 democrats which gives the republicans 39 majority. Speaker Cannon was given a strong endorsement by his district notwithstanding the fight made on him. There seems no doubt that he will be re-elected speaker of the new House which will begin its sessions shortly after March fourth.

Taft actually carried Greater New York. This comes, it is said by the failure of Tammany to loyally support Bryan. The organization in the big city wanted to beat Hughes, and so hold the state organization, more, than to win nationally. The following states gave their votes to Taft giving him 311 electoral votes or 139 majority over Bryan: Maine, Vermont, New Hampshire, Massachusetts, Rhode Island, Connecticut, New York, Pennsylvania, New Jersey, Delaware, Maryland, West Virginia, Ohio, Indiana, Illinois, Wisconsin, Iowa, Minnesota, North and South Dakota, Kansas, Wyoming, Colorado, Idaho, Washington, Oregon, California. The territories of Arizona and New Mexico also vote for Taft.
