TWO FAMILIES ARE BEREAVED

DEATH ANGEL DESOLATES DENISON HOMES THIS WEEK.

JAMES POWERS DIES SUNDAY

While Mrs. Zea Succumbs on Monday Evening. Both Were Dearly Beloved by Friends And Kinsmen.

Two Denison homes have been left desolate this week. From one the father was called after an honored life of more than three score and ten; from the other a tender mother, still in the prime of life, was released from the suffering with which her later days had been filled.

Death of James Powers.

Mr. James Powers died at his home southwest of Denison on Sunday, Nov. 15, after a brief illness, although he had been failing for some time.

Mr. Powers was born in Kilkenny, Ireland, in 1836. He came to the United States while still a young man living first at St. Louis, where he was married to Miss Catharine Malone. After ten years' residence in St. Louis he removed to Benton county, Iowa, where he lived for seven years. He came to Crawford county eighteen years ago and has since resided on the farm where his life work has just been ended. Mr. and Mrs. Powers were the parents of four children, Edward, who died in 1892, William, Mae and Alice, who survive their parents, Mrs. Powers having died a year ago. Mr. Powers was a careful, considerate and industrious man. He lived in the fear of God and reared his family according to the teachings of his religion. That he was honored and respected by all was evidenced by the large number of friends who joined in the last sad rites at St. Rose of Lima church on Tuesday forenoon.

Death of Mrs. E. L. Zea.

Friends and acquaintances were greatly shocked to learn on Monday evening of the death of Mrs. Edward L. Zea. On Sunday she had been taken to the hospital where an operation for strangulated hernia had been performed, but too late to save her life although she rallied bravely on Monday forenoon. She was a faithful and loving wife and mother and the sympathy of all is extended to the sorrowing ones. Funeral services were conducted at the home on Tuesday afternoon, Rev. J. H. Senseney officiating.

Mary Jane George was born in LaSalle, county, Illinois, March 20, 1861. She was married to Benjamin F. Riggleman May 1, 1879. Three children were born to their union, two sons, John L. of Sioux Falls, S. D., and Chas. W. of Hartford, N. D., also one daughter, Mahala T. Naramore, of Dunlap, Iowa.

She was left a widow Feb. 23, 1884, and was married to Edward L. Zea Dec. 25, 1887. Four children were born to them: Geo. A., Lulu E., Elmer S. and Ward H. She leaves all her children, her husband, two brothers, Newton and Wilson George, and scores of friends to mourn her death.

ALL SICK WITH TYPHOID FEVER

Deloit Father Dies Leaving Three Motherless Children, All Sick With Typhoid.

Richard Hattery, a well known citizen of Deloit, died at 2 o'clock this morning from typhoid fever. The wife and mother died nearly two years ago, and recently the little family of three children, aged five, seven and nine years, was stricken with typhoid fever. The father nursed his little ones until he too fell a victim of the disease and his system, weakened by long vigils, quickly succumbed to its ravages. The three children are still in a precarious condition. Funeral services will be held in Deloit on Friday at 1 p. m. at the church of the Latter Day Saints. This is one of the saddest of the many sad deaths the Review has been called upon to chronicle, and no heart can fail to go out in sympathy to the sick and orphaned children.



EX-UNION SOLDIER DEAD.

Benjamin White of Vail a Union Veteran Dies While Listening to Reading of the Bible

Benjamin White, an old and respected citizen of Vail, died at the home of his son, William, in Vail Friday morning, Nov. 13, 1908, and was laid to rest in the Vail cemetery Sunday afternoon, beside his wife, who died a few years ago. The deceased was born in Yorkshire, England in 1833, and was married there Nov. 25 1855. In the year 1857 he with his wife immigrated to this country, and settled in Illinois, not far from Chicago, where he lived for about fifteen years. In 1872 he came to Iowa and settled in Jackson township north of West Side, where he lived for about fifteen years. He then sold this farm and purchased a farm one mile east of Vail which is now owned by his son, Clark. There was born to Mr. and Mrs. White seven children, two remain to mourn their loss, William, who lives in Vail, and Clark who lives on the homestead, the rest of the children

died in infancy. The funeral took place from the Presbyterian church and was attended by a very large concourse of relatives and friends. Rev. Hostetter preached the funeral sermon. The pall bearers were: B. O'Donnell, E. T. Ryan, Mr. Bartlett, Frank Woods, Wm. Dobler and Mr. Spitzbarth of Rockwell City, Ia. He served in Co. K, 153 Ill. Vol. and was with Gen'l Thomas. He was made corporal July 1 1865. He was unassuming in his ways, strictly honest, a good neighbor and well liked by all who knew him. May his ashes rest in peace. His son, Will, is prostrated over the death of his father and was unable to attend the funeral and is now (Monday) very low. He is threatened with a severe attack of pneumonia. Over a dozen citizens of Denison were in attendance at the funeral. His wife whose maiden name was Elizabeth Wimble died four years ago. Mr. White died sitting in his chair listening to his granddaughter read the bible.

DENISON AGAIN THE WINNING TEAM

IN A HOTLY CONTESTED GAME PURPLE AND GOLD VICTORIOUS.

SCORE WAS SEVEN TO NOTHING

Our Denison Foot Ball Team Well on the Way To High School Championship of The State. Next Game With South Omaha Nov. 26.

In the cleanest game of the season Denison defeated Harlan High School football team by a score of 10 to 0 Saturday. The ground was covered with snow making the footing very slippery, and the ball soon became coated with ice. The teams were about even in weight. In many respects Harlan has the best team Denison has met this year. They are clean, manly fellows, clear to the core, and the game was not won till the whistle blew for the close of the second half.

Harlan won the toss, and Denison kicked off. Harlan immediately punted. Romans and Dannels, behind splendid interference brought the ball back into Harlan's territory by a couple of end runs. On a dry field, either run would have resulted in a touchdown.

Denison was held for downs and Harlan again punted. Denison worked a couple of outside kicks and got the ball to Harlan's 35 yd. line where, a drop kick fell short, and Harlan punted out of danger.

About two minutes before the close of the half Dannels recovered a punt and raced 30 yds. for a touchdown. The half ended with the score 5 to 0.

In the second half Harlan kicked off to Denison, and Denison continued to use the outside kick. Everyone almost took a hand in recovering punts, and in that way the ball was worked down into Harlan's territory. About the middle of the half, Dannels recovered a punt and with Romans for interference ran over for the other score. Goal kick failed. Harlan tried desperately to score, but couldn't. Their quarter back reeled off a couple of runs that gave Denison a score, and on a dry field he might have got away for a touchdown. The Denison line was a stone wall except on one play, which made Harlan about 8 yards.
