

MANILLA SADDENED BY THREE DEATHS

ALL WERE PROMINENT CITIZENS IN THE PRIME OF LIFE.

SONS AND DAUGHTERS MOURN

Mrs. Nellis, Mrs. Miller and Mr. Will Graham Answer the Roll Call of Death.

The residents of this community were surprised Monday to hear of the sudden death of Mrs. R. W. Nellis, who passed away Sunday evening at 8 o'clock at her home six miles southeast of town. Death came from heart failure and nervous prostration. Mrs. Nellis had been in the best of health and was not taken sick until the middle of the forenoon on Sunday and died that evening.

Mary Roszell was born in Greensburg, Indiana, June 11, 1850. Her parents moved the same year to Benton county, Iowa, where they resided until 1876 when they moved to Shelby county, where they have since made their home. On May 9, 1872, she was united in marriage to R. W. Nellis. To this union were born seven children: Mrs. J. W. Martin, Blanche, Wilbur, Oliver, Dan, Fred and Carl.

At ten years of age she was converted and united with the Methodist Episcopal church and lived a true Christian life.

Funeral services were held Tuesday morning, Nov. 10, 1908, at 11 o'clock at the M. E. church, conducted by the pastor, Rev. M. M. Cable, and the remains were brought to their last resting place in Nishnabotny cemetery.

Mrs. Nellis will be missed greatly for she was a loving mother and wife, kind neighbor and gained many hosts of friends here in her sojourn on earth.

The entire community extends heartfelt sympathy to the relatives in their hour of sorrow and bereavement.

Saturday evening, Nov. 14, 1908, at 12 o'clock occurred the death of Mrs. Charles Miller at her home five miles northeast of town, death resulting from pneumonia.

Minnie Olive Thompson was born in Clinton county, Iowa, July 5, 1862. She moved with her parents in May 1871, to Crawford county. She was married to Charles Miller Feb. 15, 1883. To this union was born eight children. The first, Nellie, died in infancy. Those who survive her are Frank, William, John, Alfred, Hugh, Guy and Clarence.

She leaves a husband, seven sons, seven sisters and two brothers to mourn her loss. She was converted in the M. E. church under Rev. Patterson's preaching in 1876 at the age of 14 and has since lived a consistent Christian life.

Funeral services were held in the M. E. church Tuesday afternoon, Nov. 17, 1908, at 1:30 and all that was mortal was laid to rest in the Nishnabotny cemetery, but her soul has gone to its just reward. The immediate relatives have the beautiful sympathy of the entire community in their hour of sorrow.

Friday Nov. 13 at about eight p. m. occurred the death of our townsman, Will Graham, after an illness of a few days caused by pneumonia. Mr. Graham seemed to be in his usual health, in fact, he was up town the first of the week. Wednesday evening he was taken seriously ill and died two days later.

Mr. Graham was a good man, loving husband, and father, kind neighbor, always ready to lend a helping hand to anyone who sought aid.

Greatly will he be missed from our midst.

Willie C. Graham was born June 23rd, 1869, in Iowa county, Wisconsin. At the age of three years, he came with his parents to Crawford county, Iowa, where he has since resided except for some few months which he spent in Nebraska. He was married to Mrs. Lizzie Saul, nine years ago. He has spent the greater part of his life in Manilla, where he died at his home November 13, 1908. He leaves to mourn, his loss a wife, mother, Mrs. Sarah Graham, three sisters, Mrs. Agnes Carothers of this place; Mrs. Arlow Calwell of Berkeley, Iowa, Mrs. Henry Hargens of Manning, Iowa, and two brothers, Alvin and Delbert Graham of Avon, S. D.; a stepson, Willie Saul, and many other relatives.

Funeral services were held at 3 o'clock Sunday afternoon at the M. E. church, conducted by Rev. M. M. Cable, who delivered a beautiful sermon. Remains were laid to rest in the Nishnabotny cemetery.

The pall bearers were George Hird, Homer Teeney, Clayton Baker, R. C. Saunders, Chas. Schroeder and Jack Conner.

The Quarterly Missionary Tea of the Presbyterian church will be held at the home of Mrs. John Calvin Thursday afternoon. A good program will be given.




