

## BAPTIST FOLKS HOLD A RALLY

INTEREST IN COLLEGE AND MISSIONARY  
WORK AROUSED.

### PROF. LOUGHRIDGE PREACHES

Dns Moines College and Sac City Institute  
Make a Campaign for Funds.

A unique and successful rally in the interest of Christian Education was held last Sunday at the First Baptist church. Prof. Loran D. Osborn and Prof. Albert Loughridge of Des Moines College were here and Principal W. Lee of Sac City Institute. Principal Lee is well known in the city, since he was at one time Principal of High School and his wife's home is here, her father, Mr. J. M. Potter still living here.

Prof. Loughridge is well known in Iowa. He is a graduate of the State University and taught Latin for eleven years at the Normal School at Cedar Falls. He was in an Iowa Regiment throughout the Civil War. He has spent thirteen years, at two different times in India, and is a man of ripe scholarship and broad experience. He is now engaged in assisting Pres. Osborn in holding rallies throughout the state in the interest of the college.

The big day of the rally was Sunday. Prof. Loughridge preached in the morning a strong and interesting sermon. He took Christ as the typical man, whom all ought to follow and showed how, contrary to common belief he was a man of usual education, being familiar with at least four languages, one of which was a dead language and also with the scientific and commercial knowledge of his time. This sermon was followed by brief talks by Principal Lee and President Osborn with reference to the Institutions which they represented.

At the Sunday School hour Pres. Osborn talked to Mrs. Jones's class of boys for a few minutes and also to a joint meeting of the "Baraca" and "Philathea" classes. Prof. Loughridge gave another interesting talk on the "Children of India."

Principal Lee lead the Young Peo-

ple's Meeting, which was a largely attended and full of interest. Following this meeting there was a platform educational meeting. Principal Lee in an address on "Education and Service" showed how the man of education was fitted to do a large and better service to humanity than the man who did not have this training.

President Osborn gave an address on "The Overflow" in which he brought out the fact that the beauty and work of the world is due to the overflow from individual lives and that this overflow is made possible only as one keeps in touch with the sources of inspiration. The two sources of inspiration upon which he especially dwelled were "Books" and "Companions." Prof. Loughridge followed with a strong talk on the subject "Does It Pay?" in which he gave incidents of how men who had "toughed it through college" had attained high positions of great usefulness. President Osborn addressed the High School on Monday morning and Principal Lee did the same on Tuesday morning.

The immediate occasion of the conference was the movement that is on at Des Moines College to raise \$100,000 and at the Sac City Institute to raise \$30,000.

The Des Moines college is well known in the city, as many as a dozen students having been there at one time. Last year Mr. Townsend E. Pearson graduated and there are several former students and Alumni in the city including Dr. and Mrs. Plimpton, Mr. and Mrs. Leon M. Cassidy, Mr. R. S. Cassidy, Miss Fanny Hayes and Miss Minnie Davis. Prof. J. M. P. Smith, of the University of Chicago whose early home was here is also a graduate of the college as was Prof. Lee himself. Prof. Smith has become authority in his line of work which is "Somites" and everybody knows the magnificent work that Prof. Lee has been doing for the past ten years at Sac City.

Taking it altogether, the Rally was a great success and has turned the attention of many of the young people more earnestly towards the importance of a college through the hearty cooperation of Rev. C. E. LaReau, pastor of the First Baptist church and his people, who are thoroughly in sympathy with Christian Education and with the work of these schools.

## HOSPITAL WILL CHANGE HANDS

REV. FATHER FARRELLY SECURES OPTION  
ON HOSPITAL STOCK.

### WILL DONATE TO MERCY SISTERS

Catholic Prelate Devotes O'Connor Estate to  
Denison Charity. Successful Conduct of  
Hospital Assured.

Rev. Father M. J. Farrelly acting as trustee of the John O'Connor estate, the bulk of which was left to such charity as Father Farrelly might select, has secured an option on the stock owned by Mr. and Mrs. J. M. Johnson and has also offered to pay fifty cents on the dollar to the other stockholders. Already more than half the stockholders have accepted this proposition and there seems to be no question but that the deal will go through.

The portion of the O'Connor estate left to charity amounts to about \$9000. The expenditure of this sum rests entirely with Rev. Father Farrelly and he is to be commended that he has decided to use the money for a Denison charity.

We understand that Father Farrelly intends to assume the indebtedness amounting to \$1000. Mr. and Mrs. Johnson receive approximately \$3,000 for their interest and the other stockholders will receive about \$5000. As this money was not subscribed with the idea of an investment the stockholders are glad to see their object accomplished—the erection and operation of a hospital—and at the same time receive half of their money back. Father Farrelly proposes to turn the hospital over to the sisters—free from all debt and it is then believed that they can operate it successfully. The deed will provide that in case it ceases to be operated as a hospital the property shall revert to the city of Denison. It will be further stipulated that no person shall be refused admission on account of poverty or inability to pay the hospital charges.

The Sisters successfully operate many of the best hospitals throughout the world. It is one of their

rules to make no difference as to creed or wealth or station. There will positively be no favoritism of any kind and we believe the hospital could be in no better hands.

Mr. and Mrs. J. M. Johnson have given the hospital splendid and efficient service. They have worked hard, against great odds and have shown an enthusiasm and zeal which will be better appreciated as time goes on. That Denison has a hospital to-day, is due, more to the faith and energy of Mrs. Johnson than to any other person. The attempt to run a hospital as a private institution has proven a heavy task for them and Mrs. Johnson now finds that her added responsibility as a mother requires much of her attention. Together with other friends we wish them every success in future. We believe no one could make a success of a hospital in Denison as a private institution and so we welcome this change which will place it in the hands of a world-wide organization of those sisters whose lives are devoted to good deeds and acts of mercy.

We feel too that the thanks of Denison are due Rev. Father Farrelly for this wise and thoughtful disposal of the funds left to his discretion.
