Side Lights on Next Sunday's Lesson for Teachers and Pupils.

December 6. Solomon Chooses Wisdom. 1 Kings 3:4-15.

Our lessons for the next two weeks consider the life of Solomon, the son of David, who succeeded him as king. It would appear that Solomon was but eighteen years old when he began to reign. Following the customs of the times he went to Gibeon, which was on an elevated piece of ground where he built an altar and offered sacrifices to God. By the "customs of the country" is meant that high points of ground were considered sacred, nearer to deity, the most appropriate place to worship God. After the building of the great temple, the good Jews concentrated on Jerusalem as the place of worship. It will be remembered that when Jesus met the woman of Samaria she asked as to the proper place to worship God, and the reply of the Master, John 4:23-24. "The hour cometh and now is, when the true worshippers shall worship the Father in spirit and in the truth; for the Father seeketh such to worship Him. God is a spirit; and they that worship Him must worship Him in spirit and in truth." It were well if that great truth were well settled in the minds of all readers.

While at Gibeon God appeared to Solomon and asked him "What shall I give thee?" Solomon then made the choice which stamped his character and life for all time to come. He chose "Wisdom" to know the will and mind of God, as far as in the

human to do so. For this choice God rewarded him many fold, by declaring that He would not only give him Wisdom, but wealth, power, human greatness. Solomon thought this had all been in a dream, but went back to Jerusalem and before the ark of the Lord he performed imposing religious ceremonies. In the Proverbs written by Solomon he lays great weight on the value of wisdom. In the second chapter and sixth and seventh verses he says, "The Lord giveth wisdom, out of His mouth cometh knowledge. He layeth up sound wisdom for the righteous, is a buckler to them that walk uprightly." In the third chapter Solomon eulogizes wisdom, saying it is better than gold and silver, more precious than rubies, has length of days, her ways are pleasantness and all her paths peace, a tree of life, and happy are those who retain it.

We come to the great central thought for us. The Golden Text of this lesson should be the great command and advice of the blessed Jesus, "Seek ye the kingdom of God and all these things shall be added unto you." Here is the lesson to us today. As Solomon made the wise choice of knowing God's will, as he chose Godliness above all else, so should we today cast every thing aside and reach after the pearl of great price—the kingdom of God and his son Jesus. "What shall it profit a man if he gain the whole world and lose his own soul?" This is the question that every person of age of understanding must answer. May God's spirit move our readers and those whom they can influence to make choice of "the kingdom of God" and trust God, that He will add all other things needful.

Project for Good Roads.

The business men of Red Oak, Montgomery county, are alive to the benefit to the town of "good roads." To help the good work along they have put up cash prizes to be awarded in October 1909 for the best mile of road. We commend the example to the business men of Denison. The following are the rules of the contest:

Capital prizes, \$75.00 for best mile of road, \$35.00 or second best mile, open to all; also \$25.00 for best half mile road and \$15.00 for second best on each of the eight rural mail routes leading out of and returning to Red Oak. No one piece of road is to be eligible to two prizes and first prize road to be barred in subsequent competitions. When there is not more than two contestants entered for each prize, said contest to be declared off.

RULES OF CONTEST.

No. 1. All work must be within ten miles of Red Oak and must be done with the King drag.

No. 2. Each contestant must declare his intention to compete for prize within thirty days.

No. 3. The same man may compete for capital prize and prize on his rural route, but to do so must enter one and one-half miles of road and specify which portion is for capital prize. The road need not adjoin the contestant's farm. He is at liberty to select any piece of road that he prefers, provided he can make satisfactory arrangements to do so.

No. 4. The judges shall have power to rule out of consideration any piece of road that does not in their opinion show evidence of at least a reasonable amount of attention. Mr. D. Ward King will be secured as chairman of judges if possible.

No. 5. The contest will close in October, 1909, and the prizes awarded as soon thereafter as competent judges can decide who are winners.

Denatured Alcohol Plant.

For many years farmers, manufacturers and merchants in Nebraska have been crying for a systematic denatured alcohol campaign, believing that such an institution would lead to a wonderful industrial development in this state where so many by-products could be made with so little comparative expense.

The National Corn Exposition has met this cry and has established a denatured alcohol plant under the direction of the Government Department of Agriculture to be managed by a scientist, Dr. E. C. Sawyer. This plant has been brought here from Cincinnati and is one of the best and largest in the country.

Secretary of Agriculture Wilson himself was instrumental in having this concession made to the corn show and to the people of the west. Corn figures in more than 150 commercial products, of which glucose, perhaps, is the greatest. Twelve glucose factories consume something like 50,000,000 bushels of corn a year, which means thirty cars or a whole train-load a day of twenty-four hours.

One of the newest products from corn is oil, and it has been so refined as to form a good substitute for olive oil. Already it goes into the manufacture of soap, nitro-glycerin, smokeless powder, pharmaceutical glycerin and a number of other articles of as widely-different character. This oil is extracted from the kernel of the corn.

There are hundreds of ways in which the systematic use of alcohol made from corn will certainly increase the value of that cereal not only in the vegetable, but in the commercial and industrial world as well.


