Called to Her Home.

Mrs. Louis Mueller died at her home in the southeast part of town Friday, Jan. 1, at 7:30 p. m. at the age of 60 years, 9 months and 16 days.

The cause of her death was apoplexy, with which she suffered for some time.

Mrs. L. Mueller (nee Kohm) was born March 16, 1848, at Griebon, Pommern, Germany. Here she lived until twenty years of age when she emigrated to America with her father and resided for the first five years in Garnavillo, Iowa. Here she was married to Mr. L. Mueller. The young couple moved to Nebraska and after living there for two years and a half removed to Iowa in 1873 and settled down in East Boyer township, Crawford county. Six years ago they retired from the busy farm life and moved to Manilla. Their matrimonial life was very happy and was blessed with ten children, one who died in infancy, the rest are grown and all live here with the exception of one daughter, who lives in Dakota. Although she was very sick the last few years of her life, her death came as a shock to our community. She was a faithful member of the Lutheran Trinity church and its Aid Society. She leaves a loving husband and nine children to mourn her death namely: Mrs. H. Lockmiller, Mrs. Carl Saltwell, Herman Mueller, John Mueller, Mrs. Herman Lockmiller, Mrs. Louis Bohlander, Mrs. Frank Bohlander, Miss Augusta Mueller and Miss Elsie Mueller.

The funeral took place in the Evangelistic Lutheran Trinity church Tuesday at 2:00 p. m., Rev. H. Wendt officiating, and was largely attended which goes to show the high esteem in which she was held by all who were acquainted with her. Interment was made in the Nishnabotny cemetery. The immediate relatives have the deepest sympathy of the entire community in their hour of bereavement.

Another Life Gone to Its Reward.

children to mourn his loss. The funeral took place Wednesday at 11 a. m. at the residence, Rev. H. Mundt officiating and interment was made in Manning cemetery.
