KILLED BY THEIR MOTHER

A HORRIBLE CRIME COMMITTED IN CALHOUN COUNTY.

KILLS CHILDREN WITH RIFLE

The Father Was Drinking and the Mother Became Crazy and Shot Her Off-Springs.

Following is an account of the awful crime committed by Mrs. A. J. Powell, near Lake City, last week, as copied from the Rockwell City Advocate.

A tragedy that shocked the people of the entire county occurred Monday noon at the A. J. Powell home in Lake Creek township, nine miles southwest of Rockwell City, when Mrs. Powell shot her three little boys and then attempted suicide by shooting herself. About 1 o'clock Monday afternoon, Coroner A. C. Norton was notified of the deed and he, accompanied by County Attorney F. F. Hunter and Sheriff Dawson went at once to the scene of the crime. They found one child dead with a twenty-two calibre rifle bullet through his heart and the other two little fellows in a critical condition from similar wounds through the lungs, the mother who had committed the awful deed was lying on the couch with a gun shot wound through her body in the region of her heart and another flesh wound in her arm. Two of the innocent little victims of the frenzied woman lay on the floor where the fatal shots had left them, but the oldest one had been able to move about and had been placed upon the bed.

The evidence produced at the inquest through witnesses examined and through farewells letters written by Mrs. Powell to relatives and friends before she committed the deed, brought out the fact that Mr. and Mrs. Powell had not been congenial to each other and had not lived happy for several years. She was of a nervous, high strung temperament and was inclined to worry and fret over her husband's short comings and imagined them of a much greater and more serious nature than what they really were. She had discovered that he took a drink of whiskey occasionally and although he never got drunk and was always kind to his family and was a good provider, she could not endure the thought of his touching the horrible stuff which had ruined so many lives and which she no doubt feared would get the best of him sooner or later. Mr. Powell had spent Sunday afternoon at the home of one of the neighbors and in some manner his wife had learned that he had been drinking. When he returned home a quarrel ensued and they decided to separate, and she prepared to take the children and go to the home of her mother in Illinois. Mr. Powell hitched up and took them to Sherwood to take the train, which failed to stop there, hence they were compelled to return home. Monday morning Mr. Powell prepared to go to a neighbors to help shell corn and when he was ready to start his wife told him he had better kiss the children good-bye, as she was going to take them and go away. He did so and left, thinking that the domestic cloud would soon blow over as others before had done. About noon a neighbor woman stopped at the Powell home and was met in the front yard by the oldest little boy who announced, "Mama is shooting us." She ran to another neighbor's house and phoned for Mr. Powell. When he arrived he found one child dead and the other two seriously wounded, and his wife on the couch with one bullet hole through her body and just in the act of firing another one into her heart. He seized the gun and in place of the bullet passing through her heart as she had intended, it entered her left arm near the shoulder.

The verdict of the jury was that Derwin Powell came to his death by a gun shot wound inflicted by his mother. Andrew J. the youngest child, succumbed to his wounds about six o'clock Monday evening, and his death was most touching. Just before the end came he called for his papa and when Mr. Powell stooped over his child to hear what he might have to say, the little sufferer placed his arms about his neck and kissed him, and in another minute had breathed his last. The oldest boy, Charlie, and the mother are still living, and may possibly recover, in the event of which the woman will have to stand trial for murder. She was placed under arrest Wednesday by Sheriff Dawson and a guard, in the person of S. A. Smith, has been placed in the home.

The children were all bright, handsome little boys aged three, five and six years, and it seems that a mother could not be otherwise than insane who could deliberately take the lives of her babes whom she most certainly loved. If the man's life was as bad as his wife seemed to think this terrible tragedy that has come into his life is surely a fearful lesson. We do not care to judge either the man or woman but will leave it to our readers to form their own opinion.

The funeral of little Derwin and Andrew was held at 2 o'clock this afternoon. The services were held at the house and the little bodies were consigned to the earth in Cottonwood cemetery south of Lake City.
