CITY COUNCIL IN FEBRUARY SESSION

USUAL MONTHLY BILLS PASSED, INCLUDING PUMPING BILL WITH NO CUT.

DEEP WELL PROBLEM CONSIDERED

The Expense Will Run to Over \$7,000 and Council Hesitates to Act. Must the Question be Submitted to Vote?

Monday evening was the time for the regular meeting of the city council. Mayor Rollins could not be present as he was playing in the band at the opera house.

The report of the mayor showed that he had collected and turned over to the city treasurer a total of \$577.85. The main items of receipts were as follows: Fines \$11.50; Mulct tax on five saloons \$250.00; Bowling alley licenses \$9.65; Pool halls \$37.50.

The ever recurring question of water supply now came to the front, by a report of Councilman Wright as to the bids received.

The bids received, and then on motion all but those submitted by Mr. Ebergall, and by the Miller Artesian Well Co. were rejected, and the certified checks with the rejected bids were ordered sent back to bidding firms. Of the two bids considered, each was different in language, and the council could not readily decide on which was the best for the city.

The problem of how the money is to be raised to pay for this improvement confronts the people and the council. Some of the council consider that out of the money received from water rents, the debt could be paid in due time.

The income now received from rents is figured about \$3,000 per year. Some councilmen say the improvement is the debt of the city, and that the expenditure cannot be made without a vote of the people.

SUM ONE THOUSAND DOLLARS

Case of Burnett Vs Lang is Continued But Change of Venue is Denied.

The case of Weill, Warner & Gasmer vs The Denison Clothing Co., C. C. Kemming and Julius Sonksen, co-partners, was tried today. Kemming was engaged in the clothing business in Denison and was doing business under the name of the Denison Clothing Co. Sonksen bought an interest in the store and partnership was formed between Kemming and Sonksen, but they continued to do business as the Denison Clothing Co.

It developed, however, on the trial, that the checks which were claimed to have been sent in payment of the partnership account were sent by Kemming to the plaintiffs with directions to them to apply on other indebtedness of Kemming which was incurred to another firm before the partnership was formed.

The following cases were stricken: Tillinghast vs Maurer; Voss vs Day and Tillson; Park & Karschner vs Geo. Reed et al.

When the case of W. H. Kraft vs J. F. Kortman was called for trial, no one appeared for the plaintiff, and the case was dismissed for want of prosecution.

The cases of Anna Ruchti vs William Ruchti, and Silas J. Conyne vs Alfred Martin Conyne were dismissed.

Anna Niesz was granted a divorce from John W. Niesz on statutory grounds.

Elmer Johnson pleaded guilty to the charge of assault and battery and was fined \$20.00 and costs.

AN OLD SOLDIER MUSTERED OUT

ANOTHER WELL KNOWN RESIDENT OF DENISON FOUND DEAD IN BED.

VETERAN WM. WALLACE HOVER.

He Dies During Tuesday Night. Fails to Respond to the Call of His Wife on Wednesday Morning.

Again comes the news that a citizen has been found dead in his bed. While this has become common in Denison, yet there is always a shock to the community when it is known that a life has departed without warning. This time it was William Wallace Hover, who lived on the street east from the Baptist church, opposite the E. Gulick residence.

Mr. Hover was born near New Salem Penn., September 11th, 1844 on a farm. When the war broke out he was 18 years old and at Warren, Ill. There he enlisted in 1862 in Co. "K" 96 Ill. Vol. and served until mustered out in 1865.

He was married to Miss Lovisa Converse in 1866. In 1871 the family moved to Sabula, Iowa, where he was a stationery engineer. In 1881 he moved to a farm near Mitchell, S. D., and in 1899 came to Denison. He leaves his wife and four children, besides other near relatives. His son, W. P. Hover and daughter Mrs. Arthur Green reside in Denison, and sons M. C. Hover and C. F. Hover at Sioux City. A son is buried at Sabula.

The funeral will be held Friday, but the hour is not now decided. His dear ones have the sympathy of all friends.

GRAND JURY INDICTS

Finds Oklahoma Sheriff Guilty of Unprovoked Assault Upon Hon. P. E. C. Lally.

The grand jury of Kiowa County finds the sheriff guilty of assault and drunkenness. The report fully exonerates Mr. Lally from blame as indicated by the highly colored and false report given publicity by the Bulletin. The report of the grand jury is as follows: State of Oklahoma, ss. County of Kiowa.

In the district court in and for said county and state: We, the Grand Jury, beg leave to submit the following report:

We were especially instructed to inquire into the conduct of the Hon. John W. Parham, Sheriff, and also as to the management of his office. We find that he is guilty of conduct unbecoming to an officer in that he assaulted the Hon. P. E. C. Lally, one of the attorneys for the state in the case of the State of Oklahoma vs. Scott Roop, pending in the District Court, which assault was made upon the said Mr. Lally on the 21st day of January, A. D. 1909, immediately after the adjournment of court at the noon hour, in the court room in the presence of the jury which was trying the murder case against Scott Roop, and in the presence of the defendant, and several members of the bar, and a large number of spectators, both men and women.

We further find that he has been guilty of conduct unbecoming to an officer in that he became intoxicated at his home in the jail. We recommend that the sheriff be publicly reprimanded by the court in open session of the court for his alleged misconduct in assaulting the Hon. P. E. C. Lally, and for his conduct in becoming under the influence of liquor as aforesaid.



Our Heavy Concord Farm Harness

Trace 1 1/2 inches wide, 6 feet 6 inches long, sewed 6 stitches to the inch. 1 1/2 inch triangle cockeye in end. Breeching—2 inches wide, folded, layer strap 1 1/2 inches wide, double hip strap 1/2 inch wide. Front hip strap runs through to mad carrier. Turn Back—1 inch wide with snap collar strap 1/2 inch wide runs back snap into turn back, crupper fork 1 1/2 inches wide split. Side Strap 1/2 inch wide. Belly bands 1 1/2 billets folded with 1 inch layer strap. Bridles—1 1/2 inch crown piece, 1 sides, round winker stays, cup shaped blinds, 1 bridle fronts, 1 inch nose bands, round side checks, 47 jointed bits, 1 1/2 inch hitch reins. Lines—1 inch flat, 22 feet long, 4 snaps, invincible line buckle. Breast strap 1 1/2 inch fitted with snap and slides. This harness is fitted with 7 celluloid rings.
