**ANOTHER LIFE PASSED AWAY.**

The Death of Mrs. W. E. Brocklesby Occurred February 26, 1909.

Never was a community so heart-stricken as this was, when on Friday morning they learned of the death of Mrs. William E. Brocklesby. In her departure, a loving mother, and wife, dear neighbor and fond friend will be missing in this world. Lulu Mildred Brocklesby was born in Linn County on the 22nd day of September 1874. One year later she moved to Vall with her parents, Mr. and Mrs. L. M. Hulce, where she spent the early part of life in teaching school for several terms in Hays township, also in Sac City. On August 9th, 1899 she was united in marriage with W. E. Brocklesby of Vall and has resided there ever since until about four years ago when they moved to Manilla and have resided here ever since until her departure for the other world, on February 26, 1909. To this union were born 3 children, Leslie Edward 8 years, Lyle Gerald 2½ years and an infant babe, who together with a husband, father, 3 brothers and 8 sisters to mourn her loss, her mother having passed on before. In her early life she united with the first Presbyterian church and has lived a constant Christian life. She was a member of the Brotherhood of American Yeoman in which organization from her little savings, she has kept up a policy for her little children. The funeral was held Sunday morning at 10:00 o'clock in the M. E. church, Rev. Cable preaching a beautiful sermon. The floral tributes were profuse and many which goes to show the high esteem in which she was held by all those who knew her. The pallbearers were J. C. The remains were brought back to the residence and taken to Vall Monday morning on the train, where interment was made Monday afternoon in the Vall cemetery. 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


