**COMMENT ON KELTZ CASE**

**What Our Exchanges Have to Say Concerning the Petty Graft Business.**

Boone County Democrat: Governor Carroll has caught Keltz, the pharmacy commissioner, dead to rights with the goods on him, in at least the one instance of charging up per diem and expenses as commissioner while attending the republican national convention in Chicago to boost for Cummins for vice-president. Keltz's automobile trips throughout the Tenth District with Frank P. Woods, republican candidate for congress, both during the primary and election campaigns might also bear a little investigation.

Rockwell City Advocate: The fact that Keltz was a progressive is no excuse for Governor Carroll wanting to relieve him from official duty, neither is it any reason why he should stay in office if he has been grafting off the state. Let the investigation be thorough and if it shall appear that no wrong has been done by the pharmacy commissioner Governor Carroll will be placed in an unpleasant light. If the commissioner has been charging for time not put in for the state and for traveling expenses while remaining at home all will admit that it is time for a change.

Des Moines Capital: Pharmacy Commissioner Keltz doubtless observes that Governor Carroll is still on the firing line.

Manson Journal: Governor Carroll has called upon Commissioner Keltz to quit. Keltz refused, and so the governor has turned the case over to Attorney General Byers. Keltz had better quit.

Independence Bulletin-Journal: We sincerely hope that the editor of the Chronicle does not mean that offenders of the Keltz stamp should be shielded because they were enlisted under the progressive banner in Iowa politics. In our opinion that is all the more reason why they should be dealt with. The revolt in Iowa politics which culminated in 1901 was the result of a general demand for cleaner administration, better men in office and purer administration. It was charged, and with undoubted truth, that the machine that had come to dominate Iowa republicanism demanded nothing from an officeholder but complete subservience, and that so long as he gave that he was at liberty to secure his little pickings undisturbed. Therefore, if Keltz and other appointees of progressive administrations have misused their opportunities they are doubly blamable, for they have betrayed their friends and have thrown down the men who trusted them to carry the banner of reform. Just as we expect more of the preacher, the teacher and the judge on the bench than we do of the man on the street, so do we fix a higher line of action for the officeholder who secures his place as a result of a movement for better government. If such a man falls by the wayside, he has not only proven himself no better than those he has criticized, but he has cast a cloud upon all reform movements.

Sac Sun: Pharmacy Commissioner B. F. Keltz, who was marked for official decapitation by Governor Carroll, refuses to submit. He is putting up a fight that has in it some elements of embarrassment for the Governor unless it can be shown that Mr. Keltz has overstepped the bounds of truth. The Governor alleges that Mr. Keltz has charged for time that he has not put in for the state. In other words he is accused of making his office virtually a salaried office by charging for every work day in the year when in fact there was but little work to be done. Mr. Keltz declares that he did some work for the state on every day for which he charged. He says that Governor Carroll himself, while auditor of state, as a member of a special committee of the executive council, decided that the commissioners were entitled to per diem on every day that they performed service in connection with their offices and decided also that the law does not recognize parts of days. If Mr. Keltz's statements are true it does not appear that the Governor has a very good case against him personally. Nevertheless, there remains excellent reason for changing the policy of the executive council, in which hitherto Mr. Carroll for six years appears to have concurred, and the Governor will be sustained by public opinion if he proceeds to cut out all graft in connection with the various commissions, of which the state has a superabundance.

Webster City Herald: It has been the understanding at Des Moines for years, that a per diem job, meant all the working days of the year. When Keltz gave up his drug store which was paying him \$5,000 a year, less expenses, and took a job as pharmacy commissioner, at the special request of Governor Cummins, it was understood that he should put in all his

time and catch all those traveling and cross roads shops who were doing business within the pharmacy law, but not paying a cent into the state treasury for the privilege. Keltz did that work and it took necessarily all his time. It is not expected of a per diem official that he works from 7 a. m. to 6 p. m. His days are days in contemplation of law and like court days an hour is as much a day as ten hours. When Byers gets down to hard pan he will find that Mr. Keltz has done something every day in the year and then some Sundays besides. Carroll is bent on cleaning out the Cummins men and that is all there is to this tempest in a teapot. So he is giving Keltz a lot of notoriety in hopes that he will get tired and resign. Perhaps he will and perhaps he won't.

Jewell Record: Bert Keltz of Webster City has made answer to the absurd charges brought against him as member of the state pharmacy commission by Governor Carroll who asked his resignation for over-charges for his services. Keltz's answer is straight and clean and should be enough to clear him positively. He shows that the governor as state auditor and a member of the executive council himself passed upon and allowed the bills for per diem that are now protested. Moreover as to what constitutes a day's work for a member of the commission, Keltz shows that the present governor himself was one of a committee of two who fixed the rules governing that matter and according to which charges have been made. Keltz further shows that the pharmacy commission during the past biennial period, operated at less expense, turned in more fees to the state treasury than did the state auditor's office. To top up a tree it looks like Carroll is trying to play some politics of the peanut variety. B. F. Keltz ought not resign and here is hoping that he will be accepted as having fully and finally vindicated himself.

Palo Alto Reporter: Pharmacy Commissioner Keltz still continues to be in the lime light. During the past week Governor Carroll has asked the Attorney General to take action in his case and bring the matter into court or prosecution. This is the governor's answer to Keltz refusing to resign when he was requested to do so by the governor. He was evidently posted on the fact that there was no power lodged in the governor for his removal and so concluded that Governor Carroll had not sufficient backbone to push his case. The governor was no sooner informed by the attorney general that he had no power to remove Keltz than he took the initiative for his prosecution by the courts. Keltz was a very foolish man. As his case now stands if the governor proves his point and there is no doubt but what he can, then Keltz is guilty of perjury and of obtaining money under false pretenses. Each is a serious charge, the maximum penalty being the penitentiary. The charges set forth by Governor Carroll in his statement is that Keltz was at the National Republican Convention in Chicago, June 16, 17, 18 and 19 of last year and that he charged the state full per diem for those days. He not only charged full per diem but also railroad fare from Iowa City to Davenport to Des Moines on his return trip. The statement by the governor says that he did not return from Chicago by way of Davenport but by way of the Illinois Central to Webster City and that he was in attendance on some convention in Webster City on his return home after the adjournment of the Chicago convention. He even charged for this day and for a hotel bill in Des Moines when he was at home in Webster City. The governor concludes by sentimentally remarking that there are cases of

According to the report of the state auditor, Keltz drew pay for the biennial period of July 1, 1906 to July 1, 1908 for 623 days. In this period there were just 625 days counting out Sundays. There are six legal holidays each year so that Keltz must have been a much rashed man to only get two days off in two years. The iniquitous railroad corporations were throating the people and Keltz was engaged in leading the reform army on to victory and so of course could not go without pay. The trouble is that he drew it as a pharmacy commissioner and not as generalissimo of the famous "Flying Squadron." He should have gotten a special appropriation from the legislature for his expenses in this direction and then he would not have gotten into trouble.
