The Kiron saloon was taken charge of by its new owner, Fred Quade, on last Thursday. The county attorney we are informed, notified him the day before not to open as it appeared that according to the state law it would be illegal. It was closed during the forenoon, but the new proprietor opened up for business in the afternoon upon information from a legal light at Denison that he was allowed to do so. The Anti-Saloon League representative who visited this county recently and who made an investigation found that only four of the saloons operating in Crawford county are legal and allowed to exist. We understand that a demand will be made to have the law enforced and obeyed, no matter what the consequence will result. The present liquor law is more of a farce than anything else, as technical points can be raised as to what is law and what is not law. Let the law be enforced in every respect, whether it hits the liquor traffic or other traffic, is the sentiments of our law abiding citizens.

The concert at the Kiron hall on Tuesday evening was attended by a large number of our people who were more than surprised and pleased. The

concert was given by home talents and they justly covered themselves with praise and encouragement. Two of the piano solos and one of the vocal pieces were composed by Pianist Williams and the pretty mandolin duet, is the product of Alvin Lundell of Wheeler township. Kiron has very able talents in the musical sphere and with a little encouragement and practice, they could entertain our people just as ably and satisfactory as the traveling troupes that comes through occasional.

The library at the Baptist church has met with gratifying success since its opening last December both in regards to patronage by the people and in their interests in supplying the library with books periodicals and funds. When it was announced that the library was open for inspection it consisted mainly of the stock room with its empty book racks. To-day there is in the neighborhood of three hundred volumes on its shelves, consisting of history, philosophy, fiction, science, religious works, governmental reports current magazines, daily, weekly and monthly papers. A well selected traveling library of fifty volumes from the state also adds materially to its resources. The reading room has been supplied with a set of handsome oak furniture and racks for papers writing desk and library supplies necessary for the people. The library and its privileges are open to all under uniform conditions. A small fee is charged for the loan of books otherwise no charge is made.
