MANILLA ITEMS

"Grandma" Miller passed away on Thursday morning at 3:15 a. m. at her home after an illness of seven weeks. By her departure, a loving mother, a helpful friend and a kind neighbor will be missed by those to whom on this earth she was ever helpful and kind, but she is still continuing her countless blessings in the world beyond to those loved ones who have gone on before. Helen Christina Stephan was born Oct. 23, 1837, in the Province of Hessian, Germany. In 1856 she was united in marriage to Mr. Paul Wetzel. To this union were born three children, Caroline, Owsald and Paul. In 1859 she in company with her sister, Mrs. Albin, now in Perry, Iowa, and who was present at the funeral, came to America. During the war the husband enlisted in the service of his country and went to the front where he died, in defense of the flag, leaving the wife to care for the family. In 1865 she was united in marriage to Mr. Frederick Miller, and to this union were born six children, Frederick, Emma, Louis, Frank, Mary and Julius. In 1881 she, in company with the family, moved to Shelby county, Iowa, where the years were spent till March 23, 1899, when Mr. Miller died. In early life she was confirmed in the Lutheran church. Her last illness dates back about seven weeks. All that loving hands and hearts could do was done to restore her to her accustomed health, but to no avail. On the morning of April 15, 1909, the spirit took its flight and left the sorrowing children to mourn the loss of a devoted and loving mother, and a sister to feel the loss of one who had grown to womanhood with her, and a host of friends to mourn the departure of a good, kind neighbor, having lived to the ripe, old age of 71 years, 5 months and 17 days. She leaves six sons and one daughter, (one daughter having died about a year ago), thirty grandchildren and six great grandchildren. The funeral services were held at the Methodist Episcopal church Sunday morning, April 18, at 11 o'clock, being conducted by Rev. M. M. Cable. Several hymns were rendered by the choir. Rev. Cable read the first seven verses of the 12th chapter of Ecclesiastes for scripture reading. He delivered a beautiful sermon based on the Phillipines 1:21, "For to me to live is Christ, but to die is gain." The floral offerings were many and beautiful going to show the high esteem in which she was held by all. The pallbearers were J. P. Barber, E. T. Bidlack, W. R. Grimes, George Fuller, T. W. Brown and V. Sowles. The remains were taken to Irwin for interment, where all that was mortal of this good woman was laid to rest in the beautiful Oak Hill cemetery. The sorrowing ones have the entire sympathy of the community in their hour of bereavement.
