MRS. THOS DOBSON FAILING

Mrs. Thomas Dobson One of the First Settlers of Deloit Very Ill

We know our readers will be patient this week when they do not find much news from Deloit for our excellent correspondent, Mrs. Horr, is constantly at the bedside of her mother who is nearing death's door if she has not already passed away before these lines reach our readers. Mrs. Sarah K. Dobson is now seventy-eight years old. She came with her husband to Deloit in 1852 and is thus one of the oldest settlers. Mr. Dobson was in his day the most prominent Latter Day Saint in the county and his wife was ever worthy of him. Her living children are Mrs. Horr, Mrs. James Smith of Nebraska, Mrs. Jane Kieth of Washington and Mrs. Emma Spence of Decatur county, Iowa. She has been a woman much beloved.

Later, Mrs. Dobson died on Tuesday, and the funeral is on Thursday 11 a. m.

FOUND DEAD IN HIS BED

Lifeless Form of Fred Evers Found by Neighbors at his Home. Heart Failure was the Cause of his Death

In our West Side correspondence will be found a mention of the death of Mr. Fred Evers. He was missed by his neighbors and when his home was entered he was found dead in his bed. An examination showed that heart failure was the cause. He was a brother-in-law of Mr. Chas. Evers of Denison and was well known throughout the county. Mr. Evers was born in Petersdorf by Oldenburg, Schleswig Holstein, Oct. 13, 1849. He came to America in 1871 and first settled in Rock Island, Ill. He was married in 1874 and during the same year came to West Side in this county. He had nine children all of whom are dead, his devoted wife died on March 27th, 1908, and he was thus alone in the world. He was a good and kindly man, honest, industrious, and respected by all who knew him. Funeral services were held on Tuesday at West Side and the remains were then brought to Denison, interment being made in the Nissen cemetery.
