Proposed Resolution of Necessity.

Be it resolved by the City Council of the City of Denison, Iowa, that as it is deemed advisable and necessary to make improvements by laying a sanitary sewer of eight (8) inch vitrified sewer pipe to be laid in accordance with plans and specifications furnished by the City Engineer of the City of Denison, Iowa, upon the following named streets and parts of streets to-wit:

On Chestnut street beginning with the intersection of Anthony and Chestnut streets to connect with a sewer at that point and thence extending west two (2) blocks on Chestnut street to connect with the sewer at the point of intersection of Chestnut and Howard street.

All expenses of making said improvement to be charged to the property abutting thereon and property adjacent thereto to a distance of one hundred (100) feet on each side of the street in accordance with the law governing the same. And the contractor who shall make said improvement shall keep the same in repair for a period of one year from the date of its acceptance by said city.

Be it further resolved that, the City Council will meet at eight (8) P. M. on the 7th day of June, A. D. 1909 at the Council Room in the City Hall, for the purpose of considering objections to said proposed resolution, and notice of said proposed resolution and of the passage of this resolution to be published as provided by law.

An ordinance re-establishing and fixing certain grades on Anthony and Walnut streets in the incorporated city of Denison, Iowa.

Be it ordained by the City Council of the City of Denison, Iowa, that

Section 1. The elevation of the grade of Anthony and Walnut streets above the Datum Plane at the following named places shall be as follows:

South West corner of Walnut street.....68.00 feet
South East corner of Walnut street.....68.00 feet
Midway between Walnut and Vine street, West side.....49.00 feet
Midway between Walnut and Vine street, East side.....49.10 feet
North East corner of Vine street.....33.00 feet
South East corner of Vine street.....28.00 feet
South West corner of Vine street.....29.00 feet
Midway between Vine street and Railroad Avenue, West side.....12.30 feet
Midway between Vine street and Railroad Avenue, East side.....12.30 feet
North East corner of Railroad Avenue.....1.13 feet
North West corner of Railroad Avenue.....1.77 feet

Walnut Street
North West corner of Howard street.....78.00 feet
South West corner of Howard street.....78.00 feet
100 feet West of Howard street, South side.....73.30 feet
100 feet West of Howard street, North side.....73.39 feet

At North West corner of Lot 4, Block 124, South side.....64.30 feet
North side of street, opposite same.....64.30 feet
