A SERMONETTE BY REV. BRYCE.

From the Ashland, Ohio, Press we clip a synopsis of a sermon by Rev. W. E. Bryce. His Denison friends will be glad to listen to him again through the columns of the Review: "Mothers' Day was fittingly observed at the services of the Presbyterian church last Sunday morning.

"Hannah, the Model Mother," was the theme of the practical sermon of the pastor, Rev. Wm. E. Bryce. He said, "One of the traits which marked Hannah as an ideal mother was her motherly instinct, her desire for children. Her greatest sorrow was that she was childless. Her constant prayer was that the Lord would place a babe in her waiting arms. This desire for children was characteristic of the Jewish women, and is more or less so of all Oriental women. It is considered a great honor to be a mother, and the childless woman is an object of pity. This is as it should be, and as God intended it, but in the artificial atmosphere of our modern Occidental civilization, with its selfishness, and love of ease, and luxurious unwillingness to assume responsibility the divine instinct of motherhood is being in many instances prevented and suppressed.

"Now it would be very unfair to make general and sweeping statements of condemnation without a full knowledge of all circumstances, but I do not hesitate to say that a woman who does not love children is a monstrosity, and that husbands and wives who shirk the responsibility of parenthood through the selfish love of comfort and freedom are trifling with the laws of God, and will surely pay the penalty. There is a certain kind of sin which is more or less prevalent in the better classes of society, among those reputed to be respectable people, that is hideous, and damnable in its blackness, and in this connection I want to say that there must be some part of the infernal regions heated seven times hotter than any other part for so-called medical practitioners who are guilty of murdering unborn children for a financial consideration. Hannah's desire for children was natural, and beautiful, and divine, and was the first mark of a true and ideal motherhood. Among other of the traits which marked Hannah as a model mother were her personal care for her babe, her early dedication of her child to the Lord, and her prayerful spirit."

Proposed Resolution of Necessity. Be it resolved by the City Council of the City of Denison, Iowa, that as it is deemed advisable and necessary to make improvements by laying a sanitary sewer of eight (8) inch vitrified sewer pipe to be laid in accordance with plans and specifications furnished by the City Engineer of the City of Denison, Iowa, upon the following named streets and parts of streets to-wit:

On Chestnut street beginning with the intersection of Anthony and Chestnut streets to connect with a sewer at that point and thence extending west two (2) blocks on Chestnut street to connect with the sewer at the point of intersection of Chestnut and Howard street. All expenses of making said improvement to be charged to the property abutting thereon and property adjacent thereto to a distance of one hundred (100) feet on each side of the street in accordance with the law governing the same. And the contractor who shall make said improvement shall keep the same in repair for a period of one year from the date of its acceptance by said city.

Be it further resolved that the City Council will meet at eight (8) P. M. on the 7th day of June, A. D. 1909 at the Council Room in the City Hall, for the purpose of considering objections to said proposed resolution, and notice of said resolution to be published as provided by law. AUTOMOBILE ADVICE

Denison motorists should follow the example set by Vail and organize an Automobile Club. The special duty of this club should be to encourage roads and to assist in a practical manner in their maintenance. One day last week the Review editor accompanied the Glidden tour Pathfinder car all the way from West Side to Woodbine.

The roads west of Dow City are very much better than those between Dow City and West Side. The defects in the roads were minor ones, however, and we believe that the expenditure of fifty dollars in little repairs to culverts, filling up "chug holes" and removing stones from one or two hills, would place this main traveled road across the county in good condition. While all of us are interested in good roads, the man who has invested a large sum in an automobile, with tires that are liable to puncture, is the most interested of any one. Our automobile owners should keep on talking about good roads, but they should supplement this by a little practical work.

There is a short stretch of road between here and Arion that is full of small rocks. Five dollars spent for labor would clear this stretch of stone for this year, whereas one jagged stone might puncture an expensive tire and jeopardize the lives of those in the car at the time.

Garage men and hotel men should be particularly interested in attending to this road before the Glidden tour comes this way in June. This road is a part of the accepted official route. One hundred cars will pass over it from all parts of the country and their report of the conditions will influence automobile travel for a long time to come. As the number of cars increases and the feasibility of long distance runs becomes more apparent, the trade of these tourists will be an important item. Denison has the hotel and garage facilities and with good roads it will become a popular cross-country stopping place.

Another thing we would emphasize at this time is that a few of our motor owners are careless and are running their cars about the city at a dangerously high speed. It is better to curb this matter now than wait until some awful tragedy stirs the public to anger, desolates some home and fills some mind and heart with a life-time of regret.

Many people are careless and some children have the idea that it is "smart" to stand in the road and see how near they can get to a passing auto without being hurt. Should a driver get rattled or should some accident occur to the car, these little ones might easily be run over. Then we would blame the motorist and have nothing but pity for the parent who was the most to blame because he did not keep his children from such dangerous play.

The automobile has come to stay. At present it is a great luxury, soon it will be a prime necessity, we might just as well adjust ourselves to the situation.

FATHER VAUGHN IS DEAD.

Boone Democrat: These words will bring sadness to the hearts of thousands of loving friends of the humble priest of God, noted author and eloquent orator. Perhaps no lecturer on the American platform in recent years has touched to the quick the lives of more people and awakened their hearts to deeds of loving service to God and to humanity than has he. A native of Wisconsin, the center of devoted Catholic faith, his highly artistic temperament early led him into the dramatic field and he soon became an actor of marked promise and ability, stirring the hearts of thousands by his masterful portrayal of the Shakespearean characters. Soon, however, he felt the call to the high spiritual life, abandoned the stage and after years of study and preparation at St. John's University was ordained to the priesthood twelve years ago. He returned to his native state and took up his work as a priest, shortly afterward he was placed in charge of the parish at Altoona, Wisconsin, and while there his great love for humanity led him to found a school for boys which he conducted for a number of years. His work there grew to large proportions and in order to sustain it he took to the lecture platform, turning all the proceeds over to the support of the school. Here his dramatic art served him to good purpose and he soon became foremost as a popular lecturer before the American people. His death came early in life, caused by the over exertion and great privations that his love for humanity induced him to suffer. He passed away at the Mercy Hospital in Dubuque at 6:00 o'clock Monday morning. The funeral was held from his parish church at Cuba City, Wisconsin, Tuesday morning, burial at Janesville.

Following is a gem of thought from his most popular lecture, "The Power of Love." In it the heart of the priest shows its great love for humanity:

"Men in blue and gray who looked with hate into one another's eyes and tried to shoot away the life of a brother have crept close together to die in the trembling twilight. Men and horses lie heaped in confusion. Men with their limbs torn from their body, men with their throats cut, and men with their scalps lying bare and their heads raised to heaven, and they are crying: 'Water, my God! water!' and in all God's world there is not a soul to answer. Yes there is an answer. See, there come two women, stealing over the battlefield, creeping along under the beams of the moon. Is it some mother come out to look for her son in the mist of death? Is it some woman who seeks the man to whom she has pledged her love? Ah, no. The cross of Christ is on her breast, the bonnet of St. Vincent on her head. Two little Sisters of Charity, alone with God and night. How they move without fear through the valley of death and of darkness! How tenderly they stoop o'er each dying soldier! For them there is no North or South, no blue or gray, no nationality, no creed, no denomination. In every soldier's upturned face they see the face of Christ. How tenderly they moisten the parched lips, how they cool the fevered brow, how they close the gaping wound, how they murmur words of consolation in the dying ear, how they take the last message to bring back to the mother and the wife and the loved ones far away! Ever there—even in the death and the blood and the carnage of battle—the power of love reigns supreme. And stamped forever on that flag—the Stars and Stripes—stamped forever, is that lesson of love, that as it leads on in the vanguard of civilization it may teach to the world, America's story: the fatherhood of God and the brotherhood of man—the glorious, the splendid lesson of love."
