IS CHARGED WITH MISCONDUCT

Committee Appointed By Judge Church Reports Adversely to Mr. Harding

We are informed that the committee of three attorneys, Messrs. Sims, Lally and Burch, who were appointed by Judge Z. A. Church to investigate the professional conduct of P. W. Harding has made its report. The report is not yet on file but it is said that there are about twelve items in the findings made against the Denison attorney. The report of the committee was made after many secret sessions and the calling of a number of witnesses. Judge Church accepted the report of the committee and has appointed Mr. Sims and Mr. Lally to prepare charges and prosecute the case. We understand that Mr. Harding has employed E. I. Salingor of Carroll and Ex-Judge S. M. Elwood to defend him. Such trials are held before the judge and not before a jury. It is probable that the case will come up for hearing during the September term, and it is thought that the judges of this district will probably ask some other judge to sit. The whole affair is most regrettable and we hope that Mr. Harding may be able to prove his innocence.

Mirror for the Sick Room.


