### Sunday School Column

Side Lights on Next Sunday's Lesson for Teachers and Pupils.

June 13. Victories of Faith. Heb. 11:1-40.

We have for the lesson this week that remarkable chapter in Hebrews on the triumphs of Faith. It begins with that definition of faith which has never been bettered. "Faith is the substance of things hoped for, the evidence of things not seen." Then starting with Abel, who had faith, the chapter calls to mind Abraham, Isaac, Jacob, Joseph, Moses, recounting in detail how they showed their faith. The chapter ends with the remarkable peroration of the last eight verses. Paul says that time fails him in writing to recount by name the hundreds of people who because of faith in God had subdued kingdoms wrought righteousness obtained promises, others had withstood torture, being torn asunder, wandered in deserts and caves of the earth, of whom he adds the world was not worthy. With the eleventh chapter on what faith had done Paul begins the twelfth, "Wherefore seeing we are compassed about with so great a cloud of witnesses," let us have like faith and go on to greater things.

The first step to being right with God and thus being in position to claim His promises and salvation through Jesus, is Faith. In the sixth verse it is declared that without faith it is impossible to please God. So it might as well be set down as a vital thing, that one have the faith in God displayed in one form or another by the men and women mentioned in the chapter.

The right faith causes one to read the promises of the bible and then act on them as true. The school boy is told in his book that a certain chemical formula will do a certain thing, that the laws as to sound, light, heat, electricity are as follows: He proceeds to act on these declarations, he has faith that the scientists are correct. In the same way we must all act on the declarations of the bible. Jesus says: "He has gone to heaven to prepare a place for us." This we must believe by faith and shape our lives so that when He comes for us we will be ready.

### REV. SAWYER TO BE A LAWYER

Temperance Man Will Give up the Ministry. To Keep Eye on Saloons

Sioux City Journal: That he has resigned as superintendent of the northwest district of the Iowa Anti-Saloon league and is about to commence the study of law in Sioux City with the intention of better equipping himself for a campaign against law breaking saloons was the announcement yesterday of Rev. H. H. Sawyer, who for some time has been a prominent figure in liquor prosecutions in Sioux City and vicinity.

Through the personal solicitation of the officers of the Woodbury County Anti-Saloon league Rev. Mr. Sawyer has consented to continue as superintendent of that organization. The state league has made Woodbury county a separate district and in the future it will not be under the jurisdiction of the superintendent of the northwest district. Rev. Mr. Sawyer will be the representative of the state league here as heretofore.

Rev. Mr. Sawyer said that it was his original intention to resign both places and enter a law school, but at the request of the Woodbury county league he had decided to enter the office of a Sioux City firm of lawyers and prepare himself for the bar in that manner. He has not completed any arrangements as yet as to whose office he will enter.

There is a possibility that no superintendent will be appointed for the northwest district at this time to succeed Rev. Mr. Sawyer. It is possible the law enforcement work will be done from the headquarters at Des Moines.

Rev. Mr. Sawyer is a graduate of Morning Side college and formerly was pastor of Haddock Memorial Methodist Episcopal church in Sioux City.

### A DANDELION CURE.

The following is said to be a dandelion killing dose and it bears the recommendation of Prof. F. W. Fisher, horticulturist at one of our western experiment stations.

Iron sulphate or copperas as a spray solution for the eradication of dandelions has been tested by several experiment stations in the United States with more or less success.

When the spray solution is properly made and applied the dandelions can be killed without injury to blue grass or white clover, except that the leaves of the white clover may be spotted a little by the iron sulphate solution—rarely enough, however, to disfigure a lawn. By keeping the lawn closely cut and well watered the clover and blue grass will rapidly recover from any injury which might result from the spraying.

An automatic spray pump, of which there are several makes, will give the best results. A pump manufactured by Brandt Bros., Chicago, Minn., has been found very convenient in experiments made at this station and is well adapted to lawn spraying. The nozzle should be such that a fine mist can be made, because if large drops of the spray solution fall on the leaves they will run off and no injury to the dandelion leaves will result. When spraying with an automatic spray or hand pump high pressure should be kept at all times, as only then will a fine spray be thrown.

One good spray pump will be sufficient for several lawns, as it takes only a short time to spray a lawn. The spray solution cannot be successfully applied with a sprinkling can, as the large drops will not stay on the leaves. Spraying should be done on a day when the wind is not blowing, when the grass is dry, and still have the roots in the soil moist enough so the lawn can go a day or without water, in order to give the spray solution a chance to do its work. If the water is applied too soon after spraying the iron sulphate will be washed off and no results will follow.

If each city in the state would start a force of men-spraying vacant lots and roadsides, and each person owning a lawn, the dandelion pest, which has given so much trouble in the past, could within one or two seasons be almost stamped out in our cities.

If the following instructions are followed out good results will follow: Procure a good spray pump, one that holds about three gallons and can be carried while spraying.

Spray when the leaves are dry and can be kept dry for several hours after spraying.

Spray with a fine mist, which can be done only with a good nozzle under high pressure.
