Carl William Herman, an old resident of Crawford county for the last six years living on Church street, died Friday evening, June 11, at 11:45 after a long, painful and incurable disease at the age of 76 years, 6 months and 22 days. Mr. Herman was born November 19, 1832, at Mocka, Province of Schlesien, Germany. In 1865 he came to America, living at Chicago. Ten years later he moved to Crawford county, farming in Goodrich township. About six years ago he moved to Denison to take life easy. In 1891 he was married to Mrs. Marie Hansen, who with four children namely: John Hansen of Goodrich, Mrs. Pauline Luitjens of East Beyer, William of Chinook, Mont., and Mrs. Wm. Miller of Denison survive him. One brother and three sisters in Germany and one sister, Mrs. Carl Schneider, of Goodrich township are also among the mourners.
