TWO DRY TOWNS IN CRAWFORD

MANILLA AND KIRON WILL HAVE NO SALOONS

REMAINDER OF COUNTY IS WET

Dow City Saloons Win by a Narrow Margin.

Question of Permits now up to Town Councils. Saloons Open July First.

The Board of Supervisors on Saturday concluded the canvass of the petitions for consent to operate saloons in the county. The petition carried, so far as the county is concerned, by a safe majority and long before the canvass was completed it was conceded by the anti-saloon people that the requisite number of voters at the last general election had signed the petitions of consent. The contest continued, however, as to certain towns in the county, especially Manilla, Kiron and Dow City. The petition failed in Manilla and Kiron, and consequently they will be without saloons, but in Dow City it won out with a small majority, and in all the other towns in the county by larger majorities. Permits are being secured from the councils of the various towns in the county and on July 1st the saloons will be in operation in all places, except Manilla and Kiron. Total number of votes cast at the general election in 1908 were 4305. Total number of legal names on the petition of consent were 3385. It required 3123 to make the 65 per cent in the county, so that there are 262 names more than were required. Every township in the county gave a majority in favor of the petition of consent. The results in the several towns in the county are as follows:

The contest which was carried on during the week was of a friendly character and outside of one slight incident that occurred, the best of feeling prevailed between the two factions until the conclusion of the canvass. The controlling consideration with both factions was to ascertain the number of legal voters who had signed the petition, and it was conceded by everyone that the board was entirely impartial and fair in the canvass and in its findings.

The result in Manilla was in fact due to a factional fight among the saloon men of the city. People will watch with interest the results in these cases of dryness in a wet county.
