MANY NEW LAWS NEXT MONDAY

BRIEF OUTLINE OF SOME OF THE NEW LEGISLATION OF IOWA

EFFECTIVE ON JULY THE FOURTH

Trains Go Dry—Jurors Get A Raise—County Officers Must Walk Chalk—First Cousins Cannot Marry

Des Moines, Iowa, June 18th:—Numerous important changes in the laws of Iowa become effective July 4th.

After that date the new primary election law requiring rotation of the names of candidates becomes effective. It becomes the mandatory duty of county attorneys to enforce the law and sheriffs will have to exercise themselves in uncovering evidence for the county prosecutor.

After this date there will be compulsory education of deaf and blind children in Iowa. The tax for dependent soldiers and sailors will be increased from one-half to one mill.

Labor will have many advantages. The old law on assumption of risk, which placed the responsibility on an employe when he worked with defective machinery, has been changed and the responsibility shifts to the employer when he is informed of the defects.

Drinking on trains is henceforth absolutely forbidden. Saloons will be limited to mule cities to one for each one thousand inhabitants. There will be inspection of hotels with the requirement they be both sanitary and safe.

There are some laws that will be of interest in rural districts. Hedge fences must be properly trimmed each year. Eight noxious weeds are described and must be kept mowed down.
