Slide Lights on Next Sunday's Lesson for Teachers and Pupils.

July 25, Paul at Athens. Acts 17:34.

We have today for consideration one of the greatest speeches or addresses ever delivered. The address made by President Lincoln at Gettysburg, and a few others only, rank with the one given by the Apostle Paul at Athens about nineteen hundred years ago. Therefore it is a rare pleasure to consider what he said at that time. Those posted on history will delight to recall the scenes which had taken place in Athens thousands of years before Christ was born, as that city and locality was the home of some of the greatest men who ever lived, such as Socrates, and other heathen philosophers. It is clear from the state of things when Paul was at Athens that the wisdom of the great Greeks did not solve the great problems of life and make the people strong, kindhearted and moral.

It would appear that on his arrival at Athens Paul looked over the city and laid about the people and their religious beliefs. Then he began to talk about Jesus and his death and resurrection. Although a stranger, his talk made sufficient impression, so that many became interested and asked that he be given a chance to speak before an assembly as to his religion. The hill, on which at the time was a great place for public assembly, is still there and shows to residents and visitors. With a distinguished and critical audience of people, before him, Paul proceeded to declare as to Jesus the Christ. He was wise in opening his address by saying that he would make known to his listeners as to the "Unknown God" to whom some one had erected an altar in the city. As his hearers were idolaters, Paul made a most convincing and unanswerable argument showing that the true God could not live in temples made with hands, and that this God could not be represented by images of gold or stone made by men. Paul further declared the "brotherhood of all men" saying that they had a common father or creator and so were of one blood.

Paul did not fail to declare as to the death and resurrection of Jesus, and to tell his listeners that they would be judged for what they did in their life time. It will thus be seen that he used skill in the address making use of the shrine or altar they were familiar with, and leading up by degrees to announcing the death and resurrection of Jesus, and a judgment to come. He further quoted from the sayings of some of the Greek poets to strengthen his argument. All in all, the address was most able and has won for Paul many words of praise.

Let it be remembered that Paul told of a judgment to come. This is all too often forgotten by preachers and teachers. God is love and wants us to be good and to love His commandments. There will come a time however, when those who have laughed and ridiculed the bible and what it teaches will be judged by it, and that will be serious business, if the life has been one of wickedness. We hope that no one of our readers will go on recklessly through life, forgetting the time of accounting, and thus miss the reward of eternal life of happiness promised in the bible.

HOW ARCHIE BRAKE MET HIS DEATH

DETAILS OF ACCIDENT BY WHICH BRAVE DOW CITY BOY DIED

HE PLUNGED TO THE RESCUE

Was Held Under by Fantic Struggles of Girl He Sought to Save. Brief Sketch of His Life

Marshalltown Times-Republican: Iowa Falls, July 14—A double drowning occurred here about 3:30 yesterday afternoon, resulting in the death of Miss Dorothy Bruce, of this city, and Mr. Archie Brake, night operator for the Illinois Central here, but formerly of Dow City, Iowa.

A big launch was recently put in service here by C. C. Bartlett and desiring a photograph of the big boat, Mr. Bartlett had invited about fifty young people to take a ride up the river while the photographer took the picture of the launch and its cargo of happy young people. The boat was taken to the river bend at Chautauqua park and was being turned so that the picture would have the high rocky bluffs as a background, but the swift current, due to the high water in the river at present, caught the boat and swerved the stern against the rocks. Seated on a double seat on the rear deck of the launch were three boys facing one way and Miss Dorothy Bruce and Miss Leona Sherry, facing the stern of the boat, while standing on the extreme rear point of the boat was Marvin Reynolds.

Caught By Guy Wire

As the boat swung around, a guy wire, used by the ice company to guy a pump pipe that extends into the river from the top of the bluff, caught the seat and precipitated the two young ladies and young Reynolds into the water. The three boys on the other side of the seat saw the danger and stood up just before the wire overturned the seat, thus escaping being thrown into the river. Instantly there was consternation aboard the boat which the pilot at once headed for the opposite shore.

Brake Goes to Rescue

The two young ladies and young Reynolds were struggling in the water and realizing their imminent danger, Archie Brake plunged into the water hoping to save Miss Bruce, who had just gone down a second time after a terrific effort to save herself. The young man sank beneath the waves and the supposition is that the young lady grabbed him in her frantic efforts to save herself and pulled him to a watery grave.

Seeing Miss Sherry struggling in the water, Mr. Bartlett jumped in, hoping to rescue her, but in the meantime, Miss Sherry and young Reynolds had manifested remarkable presence of mind and had taken care of themselves. Reynolds had grasped the guy wire shortly after being thrown into the river and slid down to the water pipe.

Others are Saved

Seeing Miss Sherry struggling a few feet away, he called to her to make for the pipe, which she did and thinking it might not hold both of them

the lad struck out for the opposite shore, as from where he was clinging the rocks rose precipitously for thirty feet or more. Spving the seat floating by he grasped it after he found his clothing made swimming difficult and using it as a float, paddled ashore. In the meantime, Miss Sherry had grasped the pipe and was soon rescued by a passing boat. Mr. Bartlett who had been struggling in the swift current, had started for the opposite shore and was pulled out in an almost exhausted condition.

Both Bodies Recovered

A rescuing party was quickly on the scene of the accident and about an hour and a half later both bodies were recovered by S. J. Gavlin. Mr. Brake has been in the employ of the Central for some time and was a young man of sterling qualities and universally liked by those who knew him. Miss Bruce was a daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Joseph F. Bruce of this city, and a young lady esteemed in this city, which has always been her home. She was a sister of Engineer John Bruce, of the St. Paul & Des Moines passenger service.

Dow City Enterprise: Archie Paul Brake was born April 11th, 1889, in Willow township, Crawford county, Iowa, and died July 13th, 1909, being twenty years, three months and two days old.

He passed his physical examination June 12th, 1907, and at once entered the depot at Dow City and began the study of telegraphy under Mr. O. J. Judd. He was so rapid and proficient in his work that in October following he was given work as extra man and was relief operator at many stations along the Illinois Central railroad.


Last October he was given regular work at Iowa Falls, only being called into the dispatcher's office during last March, after which he returned to his regular work again.

Archie was a bright young man of honor and integrity and never failed to make good in any position of trust. We are informed that he was to have been married to Miss Ida Waterhouse next fall. Miss Waterhouse has been teaching school in this vicinity a few years and is highly respected by all and this death will be a sad blow to her.

The funeral was held Thursday morning at the M. E. church, Rev. Curtis preaching the sermon. The remains were interred in the Dow City cemetery.
