Will Need More Water Now.
"Manilla Times: The city council is considering the project of calling a special election to submit a proposition for bonding the town for the purpose of erecting a new steel water tank with a capacity of 100,000 gallons, tank to be erected on a 75-foot steel tower. A new site will also have to be secured for the tank as it is stated the school board will not consent to having the new tank located on the school ground premises.
