Hon. L. T. Geunng Will Speak.



Some Court News.

An order of the court has been obtained authorizing an appeal in the case of the State vs P. W. Harding. This means that the entire disbursement proceeding will be reviewed by the supreme court of the state. The attorneys for the plaintiff are confident that the decision of Judge Wright will be reversed and the attorneys for the defense are equally sure that such will not be the case.

It is to be hoped, for the sake of all concerned that the matter will be pushed to an early conclusion and that the supreme court may act promptly.

We learn further that suit has been brought against Mr. Harding by the Iowa heirs of the Squibbs estate, seeking to invalidate the deed by which Mr. Harding now holds certain lands in Idaho.
