Soup Without a Spoon.
Soup without a spoon seems even harder to negotiate than meat without a fork, and we can sympathize with the complaint recorded in the diary of Felix Platter, a young Swiss who went to Montpellier in 1552 in order to study medicine. He lodged in the house of his professor, Cateilan one of the greatest doctors of his time, and yet, writes Platter, "we were compelled to eat our stew in the usual French fashion, that is to say picking the meat out with our fingers, and then drinking the broth. In vain we begged our hostess to let us have spoons, for not a single one was to be found in the house, the only implement on the table being a large knife fastened with an iron chain. No one here seemed to have ever heard of spoons, which we at home find so useful." Montaigne was astonished when he visited Switzerland in 1580 to find that "at all meals they put on the table as many spoons as there are people present."
