ODEBOLT DEFEATED IN CLOSE GAME

DENISON SCORES ONE TOUCH DOWN AND ODEBOLT GETS NONE

FIVE TO GOOSE-EGG SCORE

Schedule of Games Shows Denison Will be in Speedy High School Class—Thanksgiving Game at Council Bluffs.

The second game of foot ball on the schedule of the Denison High School was played at Odebolt last Saturday. Our boys were victorious in a hard fought game and succeeded in scoring five points to their opponents none.

During the first half neither side was able to cross the other's goal line. At the start of the game the Odebolt team secured the ball and carried it to within 20 yards of the Denison goal. On a fumble the Denison boys got the ball and kept possession of it for nearly all the rest of the first half, playing in their opponent's territory most of the time. When they were within 15 yards of Odebolt's goal, time was called and the first half was ended. Had there been two more minutes to play, the ball would no doubt have been carried over for a touch down.

In the second half Odebolt kicked off to Denison. The Denison team carried the ball the entire length of the field for a touch down, the only one made in the course of the game. When within fifteen yards of the goal Richardson, the quarter-back, sent Saul around the right end and the touch down was made.

In the remainder of the game our team showed their superior ability and time was called with the ball almost ready to be carried over for a second touchdown for Denison.

The game was won by its tight foot ball the forward pass being used but once and punting was resorted to only occasionally. The boys are to be congratulated as the Odebolt team put up a hard game and in it were a number of star players.

Prof. Senseney, the high school coach, refereed the game and gave satisfaction to all concerned.

This coming Saturday Audubon high school will play us here at Denison. Audubon has a strong team and a very hard contest is expected. The expenses in getting this team here will be considerable and a large crowd should turn out to help in this and to give the Denison team the encouragement they so well deserve.

The remainder of the schedule is as follows: Ida Grove at Ida Grove, Oct. 23; Harlan at Denison, Oct. 30; Audubon at Audubon, Nov. 6; Logan at Denison, Nov. 20; and Council Bluffs at Council Bluffs, Nov. 25, Thanksgiving day.

It is to be regretted that the team cannot play at home on Thanksgiving but it would not be best to have Logan here the 20th of November and then the Thanksgiving game in less than a week after. Then besides the Council Bluffs team has made a good offer to play them at home so it has been decided to play there Nov. 25th, unless some unforeseen event causes a change to be made.

A mass meeting was held in the high school last Friday afternoon at 3:30. Speeches were made by mem-

bers of the foot ball team and others. In addition many yells were given and some time was spent in learning a new foot ball song which has been written especially for the team. There was certainly a true manifestation of high school spirit and it is to be hoped that the same spirit will be carried into the other functions of the high school which are to come later.

Next Saturday, Oct. 16, the schedule calls for the first game of the season on the home grounds. The Audubon team is coming over here to win, and it is going to do so if it possibly can. This team will average in the neighborhood of 155 pounds, outweighing the locals nearly five pounds to the man, so it is up to the D. H. S. Foot Ball team to defend the "Purple and Gold" if not in weight, in team work, head work and all around consistent foot ball. The team work so far has been unsatisfactory and it is time the team was taking a brace for the coming games which will be the hardest in the state. We understand that two old veterans are now out in suits and they will strengthen the team considerably. Good results are looked for Saturday.

Following this Audubon game comes Ida Grove Oct. 23. The game is at Ida Grove this year. This is one game that we are all after. No doubt this game will be one worth waiting for the D. H. S. Foot Ball team will be in full blast and we hope it will be 23, skiddoo, for them. and on the night of the 23rd when the results are in, the foot ball fans will get up and take notice of what is doing in Denison. We understand that a large crowd is going over as arrangements have been made that we can return some time during the same night. The more the better.

Some work has been done with reference to debate. The high school has been divided into four divisions and four debaters from each division have been chosen to debate in a preliminary contest with one of the other divisions. Two preliminary contests will be held for selecting the eight best debaters and from these eight, in another debate, will be chosen the members of the team which will represent Denison high school in its debates with other high schools.

GERMAN-AMERICANS PROUDLY CELEBRATE

LANDING OF FIRST GERMAN COLONISTS COMMEMORATED

ELOQUENT ADDRESSES MADE

Rollins, Harthun, Hansen and Kuehne Make Addresses in Afternoon, Grand Ball Closes the Day.

On Wednesday, October 6th, the Germans of Denison and vicinity celebrated "German Day," the day that has been chosen as the National day of the German-Americans, the day that commemorates the coming of the first Germans to America. The attendance was large, people coming from all parts of the county to participate.

The parade turned on West Broadway and made a long march through the principal up-town streets and then marching out to Brotherhood Park. About a score of merchants made displays and the German Odd Fellows made a good showing as did the Landwehr Verein with its beautiful new banner. The Germania Verein and the German Brotherhood were also represented.

The observance of the day was continued at 2 o'clock in the afternoon. A stand had been erected and from this the orchestra and various speakers held the attention of the crowd for several hours.

Mayor W. C. Rollins made a neat speech of welcome and he was followed by Hon. J. F. Harthun. Mr. Harthun said that all over the country the Germans of the United States were celebrating the day, gathering in cities and towns to express their pride in their German origin. "German Day" he said, "was instituted for the express purpose of uniting the Germans in stronger ties of brotherly love. Formerly we heard at least once a year what fine fellows were our German fellow citizens. This was just before election and the praise came from the lips of candidates, who, in the pursuit of office, suddenly remembered that German-Americans had a vote and that it was best to jolly them up.

Hon. Carl F. Kuehne followed with an eloquent address in English. He seemed to catch the spirit of the day and his talk was filled not only with eloquence and feeling but with bright quips and sallies which served to hold the attention of his audience during every moment of his speech. Mr. Kuehne praised the Germans as great up builders, as the friends of the public school, as law-abiding citizens and as wonderful home makers. He pointed out the difference in the progress of those states of the west and central west which were largely settled by Germans and those states which were not. He spoke of the industry of the Germans, their high regard for duty, their family life, their respect for law and their love of song and music. He urged the parents to give their children the best possible education both in German and in English.

Mr. Kuehne called attention to the fact that the Germans were the first colonists to protest against human slavery and that as a race they had always stood for the widest liberty. He further stated that statistics show that there are 3,000,000 German-Americans of German birth in this country, 10,000,000 who were born of German parents and that German blood flows in the veins of about one-third of the citizens of the United States.

The address of Rev. Hansen, who was the German speaker of the day was a scholarly address which was listened to with great interest. He spoke of the historical value and origin of the day and urged the Germans of the country to use their influence and votes for good laws and to elect legislators who would look after the interests of the people. The address was characterized by much earnestness and it was received with applause which amounted almost to an ovation when the climax of his address was reached.

In the evening the Brotherhood Hall was crowded almost to suffocation with young people from town and country who tripped the light fantastic until an early hour. The society, must have netted a handsome sum from the dance that would pay the expense of the entire celebration.

The committees having the celebration in charge carried its plans to a successful conclusion and it is to be congratulated upon this good work.

The Philbrook Prize Arouses Much Enthusiasm Teams Now in Training From All Parts of the County.


Dr. B. F. Philbrook is going to write his name upon the sands of time as the philanthropist who has restored to its pristine glory in Crawford county, the ancient and honorable games of horseshoes. The old timers have been around to the window of the Corner Book Store and have gazed upon the pretty gold medal offered the champion horse shoe thrower of Crawford county and each and every man has "vumed" to win it. It is not the old-timers alone who are interested for some of the younger generation think they can throw some, themselves.

From Deloit comes the word that the horseshoe grounds have such holes in them that they have to have caddies to pitch the horseshoes out from around the stakes.

John Carey and John Muir have consented to act as judges and general managers of the games. There will be six games on at a time so that twelve men will be throwing simultaneously. Every contestant must pitch against every other contestant, so the test will be pretty accurate and by night it will be known who is the best player in the county and the winner of the gold medal can feel that he has fairly earned it. The prize goes to the individual but there is a good deal of rivalry among the different towns of the county and the games will be watched by a large crowd.

Horse shoe throwing is descended in direct line from the discus throwing of the ancient Greeks. It is one of the Olympian games that has never lost favor. The pioneers of the west had no money to waste on discus business and the worn and rusty horse shoe was requisitioned for the sport. Talk about your National game. More men participate in horseshoe throwing every month than there do in baseball in a year. Golf is the rich man's game, but horse shoe is the poor man's game par excellence. All a man needs is a horse from which to get the horse shoes, two pegs and a small portion of the public highway.

Seriously Dr. Philbrook has hit upon a simple, comparatively inexpensive and certainly novel entertainment that will give more pleasure to a lot of people than any Fourth of July celebration. He is to be congratulated upon his happy thought and the tournament should be made an annual event.

There is no entry fee, or other fee connected with this contest. The event is open to any person living in Crawford county and the gold medal is well worth striving for. In case of inclement weather the match will be postponed until the following Saturday.
