## Sunday School Column

Side Lights on Next Sunday's Lesson for Teachers and Pupils.

Oct. 17. Paul before Felix. Acts 24.

Those who have kept track of the preceding lessons know the reason why Paul is at Caesarea. He was taken there by the Roman soldiers, because the captain of the garrison at Jerusalem considered he would be safer there from the seemingly bitter hatred of the leading Jews. These were told to proceed to Caesarea and present their charges against Paul to the Roman governor of Syria, Felix. The chapter for our lesson tells how the Jews brought down for their spokesman, a noted lawyer named Tertullus, and how with flattery he began his address and ended by claiming that Paul was a disturber of the peace of the Jews and a ring leader of the sect of the Nazarenes.

Every Christian is proud of the address which Paul made in his own defense. He too, used words in the beginning to please the governor, but soon with earnestness explained his position. He said he was a follower of Jesus but defied his accusers to show that he had been otherwise than gentle, and within the laws and customs of the Jews during his stay in Jerusalem. It seems that according to Roman law it was demanded that those who witness a crime shall testify and Paul called attention to the fact that no witnesses were present which in itself was proof that he had done nothing worthy of arrest and punishment.

In the midst of this address before Felix, Paul used the language of the golden text declaring that he exercised himself, or so directed his life so to "Have always a conscience void of offense toward God and toward men." Well may this be called the Golden Text, for it sets forth a condition which every man and woman, boy and girl should strive to be in. A conscience free of offense before God and men! What a plain, short setting forth of a great truth. Cannot the readers of these words strive

to direct their lives in the same way? To be sure it will be hard to do so, but Paul sets forth the standard for living, and there is no good reason why each one should not try to attain it.

How glorious it was that Paul could stand and truthfully say that he guided his life in this way. We see that his life did not suit the mass of the Jews, was not popular, and we are not guaranteed favor with men by following Jesus, but we can have a clear conscience, and that means we can have the approval of God, and with that, what is there to want beside?

Of course Felix found nothing worthy of death or even imprisonment, but he held Paul in custody to please the Jews, directing however that he be given practical liberty as far as seeing his friends. Later Paul made another talk before Felix, and this time Paul became earnest in his manner, and reasoned of righteousness, temperance, and judgment to come, so that Felix trembled, was convicted of the truth of Paul's declarations, but like many another person since, put off until another day acting on his duty. There is no record that he ever changed his sinful life. This action of Felix has been the text for many sermons urging people to decide now, to follow Jesus and lead the right life. In truth, now is the accepted time and it is dangerous business to delay. Heaven or hell stand before every person of an age of accountability. Its up to them to make a choice. Dear reader, this column is written from week to week for the very purpose of bringing the matter of salvation from wickedness and woe to your heart and setting forth reasons why the decision you make should be for Jesus and a blessed life beyond the grave. Our advice is not to put the decision off even another week, but to act at once.

### Denison Celebration.

Marshalltown Times-Republican: Over at Denison yesterday a significant and noteworthy gathering took place when the German-Americans and the American children and grandchildren celebrated the first landing of German immigrants to America.

If the men and women who, fleeing from religion restraint and persecution in search of liberty to worship God as conscience impelled, saw yesterday the gathering at Denison and the innumerable gatherings of their descendants and the children of the Vaterland scattered over the area of a continent greater than they had dreamed or imagined, they found their faith justified and their labors and hardships rewarded. When the German-Americans gathered at Denison they represented in themselves more than the Germany of 1683; for with them came to the celebration the past and the promise of a great empire of the commonality, of a land where a peasant becomes a peer and poverty rises upon the wings of labor and economy to affluence. With splendid horses, in carriages, such as the kings of the Seventeenth century knew not, wealth in the pockets that any robber baron of them all might crave and envy, they came from vast fields heavy with unharvested corn, from comfortable farmsteads to celebrate as American citizens a memory of persecution, courage, and hope. When the German-Americans got together they represent a force that has done much in the development of material America and in the developments of that peculiar and pre-eminent world figure—the American citizen.

The Teuton and the Scandinavian are virile elements in the future of America as they are vital forces in the present and have been in the past. That they remember the land of their birth is the best pledge that they will never forget the land of their adoption. No other blood has been grafted into Americanism in such quantities as theirs and to none does real Americanism owe more. It is sturdy, helpful, fearless blood, strained clear thru ages of political tumult and the stress of idealism.
