GAVE HER LIFE

Historical dept

Sad Death of Mrs. William Fleming of Boyd at the City Hospital in Denison. Last Sunday.

One of the saddest deaths that has darkened this vicinity was that of Mrs. William Fleming, who died at the Denison hospital on Sunday, Oct. 24th, soon after having given birth to a child. As a result not only is the infant left motherless but a whole family is bowed in greatest grief over the loss of a tender, loving mother and a faithful and affectionate wife.

Mary Currie Fleming was born in Argyleshire, Scotland, on December 25th, 1864. She came to this country with her parents in 1872 and was married to William Fleming in Sac City, Iowa, on October 24th, 1883. Death came to her on the anniversary of that wedding day. To Mr. and Mrs. Fleming were born nine children, all of whom survive their mother. They are James, John, Mary, Grace, Jessie, Margaret, Nellie, William and the little babe whose advent into life was the signal for the mother's departure into the Great Beyond. She also leaves an aged mother, two sisters and five brothers to mourn her loss. Funeral services were held at the home in Stockholm township this forenoon, later at the Presbyterian church in Odebolt and interment was made in the Odebolt cemetery.

To her husband and children the loss is an irreparable one but they have the consolation that God never lent to earth a purer soul, or one that was a more constant and uncompromising doer of the right as God gave her to see the right. Mrs. Fleming gave herself to her family and to her loved ones. She was intensely proud of them and was a most devoted mother. She was a woman of broad intelligence, of great kindness and of high ideals. We regret that a portrait of this good woman was secured by us too late for publication in this issue, but the Review will publish it next week as we know that many old time friends and neighbors will appreciate this remembrance of her.

Mr. Chas Tabor was called to Independence this week to attend the funeral of his cousin, Mr. L. V. Tabor, who died last week in California. Mr. Tabor was one of the most prominent and successful business men and financiers of Independence and was accounted one of its wealthiest men. He has been a visitor in Denison as has also his son, Mr. I. C. Tabor, of Corpus Christi, Texas. He was one of the last survivors of a large family of brothers and sisters, one of whom is Mrs. S. S. Wilkinson, of this city.




