## FAITHFUL MOTHER IS CALLED HOME

MRS. PATRICK BEHAN OF DENISON TOWNSHIP SUMMONED BY DEATH.

### WAS VICTIM OF PARALYSIS

Husband, Children and Many Friends Mourn the Death of This Pious, Kind and Affectionate Mother.

On Sunday, October 31st, occurred the death of Elizabeth Keane Behan at her home in Denison Township. She had been bed-ridden for the three months preceding, a stroke of paralysis which she suffered in August, having left her helpless. While under the circumstances death may have been a relief to her, it came none the less sadly to the loved and loving ones who had been devoted to her comfort and care during her weeks of suffering and who felt that there was forever to lose her kindly, helpful presence.

No one can look upon the portrait of Mrs. Behan which we present to our readers this week, without being impressed with the strength of character, the kindness, the intelligence written there. It is such a face as Rembrandt would have delighted to immortalize upon canvas, a fit type of strong, but gentle motherhood.

Such, indeed was the character of this pioneer woman of our county, a woman who was devoted to her family, to her home and to her God. Mrs. Behan was just entering upon the threshold of old age, having been born in, Killee, county Clare, Ireland, fifty-nine years ago. She came of a

family known in Ireland, not alone for its wealth, but for its refinement and culture and for its unbroken traditions of many years.

When a lass of ten years deceased came to this country with her parents, living first in Chicago, then in Wheatland, in Clinton county of this state, and later in this county. It was here at she was wooed and won by Mr. Patrick Behan, one of our most

highly respected and kindest of men. Twenty-nine years ago they took the vows which only death could sever. Unto them seven children were born, all of whom survive their mother. They are Mrs. Mary Fitzpatrick, the Misses Elizabeth, Eva, Alice, Lillian and two sons, Leo and Joseph.

## BISHOP GARRIGAN CONFIRMS MANY

LARGE CLASS OF BOYS AND GIRLS PARTICIPATE IN SACRED RITE.

### SERMON BY FATHER FARRELLY

Bishop Garrigan Delivers a Most Interesting Religious Discourse in an Impressive But Informal Manner.

Confirmation services were held at St. Rose of Lima church, October 28, Rt. Rev. P. J. Garrigan administering the sacred rite. Father Farrelly had carefully instructed a good sized class for the occasion. The weather was bright and crisp. The boys and girls presented a neat appearance and the presence of Fathers Farrelly of Carroll, Murphy of Vail and Hansen of Dunlap helped to add dignity to the solemn service. Father Farrelly of Carroll preached the sermon of the day, which was an admirable presentation of the significance and importance of the Sacrament of Confirmation. At the close Bishop Garrigan spoke feelingly to the class, emphasizing the duty of keeping posted on all matters Catholic, of having and reading a good Catholic paper in every Catholic family.

The Bishop, in a most informal way delivered, perhaps the most interesting religious discourse ever heard in this city. Of course he spoke in language sufficiently simple so that the class—the children just confirmed—could and did understand him. He thoroughly explained the origin, nature and history of the sacrament and the ceremony and with all this argu-

ment was analytical, logical and persuasive that those present, who were not members of the Catholic church, nevertheless, hung upon his every word and listened with rapt attention.

He was evidently pleased at the numerical size of the class, and because of it, to the parish and congregation, he tendered his congratulations.
