GOOD ROADS WILL NEVER BE TALKED INTO EXISTENCE, LET US GET TO WORK

## BONDS FOR PERMANENT ROADS

Review Proposes County Committee to Secure Petition Asking Supervisors to Submit Bond Issue to the People.

The best argument for good roads is just outside your door. Look and be convinced. Farmers, business men, merchants, professional men, laborers, teamsters, mail carriers, everyone, not alone in Denison but in every square mile of Crawford county have lost time and money and comfort and patience on account of the frightful roads.

It is time to stop talking and get to work. The Review has a definite plan to propose.

Let the business men of Denison start matters. Not because they are more interested than others, but because they are the handiest to get together quickly. Let a committee of twenty be appointed, this committee to meet with the business men of the other towns of the county and secure the appointment of committees from each town and from as many township precincts as possible to become members of a county committee. Let this committee, which should consist of possibly one hundred members, or as many more as deemed best, meet, organize and get to work along different lines.

1st. To secure as many names as possible to a general petition to be presented to the board of supervisors in January asking that the question of a bond issue for the building of Permanent Country Roads be put to a vote of the people.

2nd. To secure in advance the best possible estimates of cost of construction of the permanent roads best adapted to this soil and the conditions of this county.

3rd. To propose some plan for the equitable distribution of the funds to be expended, bearing in mind the fact that none but Permanent Roads are to be constructed.

We believe it is entirely possible to bring this matter to a head within the next thirty days.

To be successful it must be thoroughly understood: That none but Country Roads are to

be built. That none but Permanent Roads are to be built.

That no community will be allowed to "hog it."

Let us stop talking and get to work; Let Vajj and Manilla and Charter Oak and Denison and all the other towns in the county work together. Above all let the farmers get busy for good roads will put dollars in their pockets for every dime that goes into the pocket of a business man.

Gentlemen; Business men of Denison, are you ready for business? Hot air never built a highway. Let us get to work.
