IRISH AMERICAN PATRIARCH DIES

DEATH CLAIMS WILLIAM J. BAUMAN AFTER LONG ILLNESS

EXPIRED EARLY THIS MORNING

Funeral of This Respected Citizen Will Take Place at St. Rose of Lima Church on Next Friday Morning.

Early this morning occurred the death of William J. Bauman, one of the best known and most highly respected of the Irish-American patriarchy of this county. For many weeks he suffered greatly and it has been known that he could not long survive. All the aid that science could give, all the ministrations that loving hands could tender, all the consolations that his church could bring were his during the hours of pain. He died at peace with God and man, surrounded by loving hearts and conscious that he carried with him the respect and affection of a very wide circle of friends.

Mr. Bauman was born in Auburn, N. Y., on the 27th day of August 1837. When twenty-eight years of age he was married to Miss Elizabeth Brosnahan and for nearly half a century they have given a shining example of the good that may come from a contented, pious and God-fearing home. Thirty years ago they came to this county and purchased the land in Denison township which has been their home since that time. Mr. Bauman held the respect and confidence of his friends and neighbors. He served his township well as justice of the peace and in other positions of trust. Mr. and Mrs. Bauman were greatly blessed in their children and it has long been the source of great pride to them that from their home five children have gone forth to devote their lives to the work of the


Catholic church. The family is unique in this respect and it is probable that no other family in America has made such a record.
