Sunday School Column

Side Lights on Next Sunday's Lesson for Teachers and Pupils.

Jan. 16. The Beginning of the Galilean Ministry. Matt. 4:12-26.

Our lesson this week calls attention to the Sea of Galilee, a body of water located in the northern part of Palestine. It is about eighteen miles long and eight wide, and at the time of the life of Jesus on earth, the sea borders contained many flourishing villages. It was well filled with fish and many people made their living by fishing. Many will recall that beautiful song, "Sweet Galilee," and when they do, it will bring to mind how important a part this sea had in the recorded life work of Jesus on earth. It would be very nice if this song was sung on the Sunday this lesson is studied.

One of the hard things about studying the four gospels is to keep straight the time, and the relationship, of one event to another. Last Sunday we learned about the temptation and one naturally would think the Galilean ministry came directly after. Those who have made a study of the life of Jesus tell us that on leaving the wilderness he went to a town called Bethabara, and there called his first disciples. From there to Cans, where the first public miracle was performed. That shortly after He went to Jerusalem where He cleansed the temple and had the talk with Nicodemus. The next great event was the talk with the woman at the well in Samaria. Soon after, He was at His native town of Nazareth where He was rejected by those with whom He had grown up. Then He goes to Capernaum, and there the events of the lesson of today took place.

The first verse of our lesson will call to mind the reasons why John the Baptist was thrown into prison and his sad death. With the arrest of John, the people and the rulers seemed turned against the new religion and Jesus found the people about Galilee, somewhat removed from Jerusalem, more ready to hear and believe. So He made His headquarters near the Sea of Galilee for some time. His going to this part of the country fulfilled a prophecy found in Isaiah the ninth chapter which foretold how people living in this locality would see a great light.

From the 17th verse of the lesson it will be seen that Jesus when he began teaching here called out as did John the Baptist "Repent, for the kingdom of heaven is at hand." So again it is seen that there must be repentance and a turning away from wrong doing to satisfy the demands of the bible. It will be seen that when walking by the sea Jesus saw two fishermen, Peter and Andrew and called them to become "fishers of men" and to follow Him. In John 1:16-20 and Luke 5:1-11 will be

found other accounts of the calling of these disciples. It will be learned that Peter and Andrew "Left their nets and followed Him." They obeyed the call and were blessed. That is the way people now must do. When they feel that Jesus wants them to live for Him they must do this at once. It will be remembered that Paul said, "I was not disobedient" when he was told what God wanted him to do. Later James and John were called and they left the fishing ship and their father and followed Jesus. Jesus performed many miracles and healed all who were brought to Him. This created a great stir and multitudes of people followed after, many drawn by curiosity.

Among many good things to be learned from this lesson, we give these: 1. Jesus did not delay, going out to preach the gospel after the baptism and temptation. 2. Hatred of John, because he fearlessly told the truth and reproved wrong, kept the people about Jerusalem from securing the great healing miracles of Jesus. 3. By the preaching of Jesus indeed came true, that the people which sat in darkness saw great light. Preaching about Him today sheds many kinds of light and benefits to all who hear. 4. The demand is yet to repent and follow Jesus. 5. Like the fisherman of old, we should think that following Jesus is the most important thing to do. 6. Jesus is as ready now to heal our spiritual shortcomings as to heal the diseases of the people about the Sea of Galilee.
