The Forty-Second Anniversary of the founding of Pythianism was celebrated by Dowdall Lodge No. 90 on Monday evening with one of the most elaborate and successful functions ever given by the Knights of Denison. The Hotel Denison afforded a delightful and luxurious place of meeting and a banquet that was both elaborate and delicious. Mr. J. E. Lyon, who has already established a reputation as one of Denison's readiest and cleverest talkers, was the well chosen toastmaster. His introductory remarks were received with round after round of applause and his bright witticisms were distinct features of the evening's enjoyment.

The three foundation principles of the order, Friendship, Charity and Benevolence were responded to in turn by W. R. Kirkup, W. E. Kahler and Prof. W. C. VanNess. Mr. Kirkup's response was given with much feeling, as for him it was farewell to the host of Pythian friends who have prized his friendship so dearly. The words came from the heart and met an answering chord with all.

Mr. W. E. Kahler gave a little gem of a toast to "the greatest of these" and again proved himself to be one of the orators of Denison.

Prof. Van Ness spoke with the delightful ease and pleasant common sense, always characteristic of his utterances. He was in a particularly happy mood and received many well deserved congratulations.

The duet, "Norma," given by Mrs. McConaughy and Mrs. Kott was a most delightful number as was attested not only by the hearty encore but by the rapt attention given the rendition of this beautiful selection. "The Courtship of Larry O'Dea" was the title of a reading given by that prime favorite among Denison's entertainers, Miss Hilda Brodersen. All the wit of the courtship of the jolly Irish lad was well brought out and nothing would do the banqueters but an encore to which Miss Brodersen responded with a selection of equal merit.

Hon. Chas. Bullock has such a well earned reputation as a "funny man" that everyone settles down for a good long laugh whenever he appears on a program. As usual his hearers were

not in the least disappointed and his response to "Pythians at Home and Abroad" was filled with clever bits and drolleries and uproarious jollity.

After the laughter caused by Denison's Depew had died away Mrs. H. A. Boyle rendered a beautiful solo, "Garden of Roses," a delicious bit of melody given with the dainty sweetness that characterizes Mrs. Boyle's singing. This number was also enthusiastically encored.

It is entirely superfluous, but as the other toasters were men and do not dare get mad about it, and as it is perfectly true anyway, we might as well say it right out, that as usual, the toast by Mrs. H. A. Carpenter was the best of the evening. "Pythianism from a Sister-in-law's Standpoint" was her theme and her talk was so clever, so filled with plums of good humor, so interlarded with good sense, so frosted with eloquence, so seasoned with wit, so sweetened with kindness and withal, so shortened with that brevity essential to a toast, that one felt as if he had partaken of some dainty confection prepared in the bake-shop of the gods as dessert for the feast.

It was with such a good taste on both the physical and the intellectual palate that the banqueters adjourned, delighted with an evening of good cheer and glad reunion.

DEATH AT DOW CITY

MRS. JAMES SCHOUTEN, AGED 70 YEARS, PASSES AWAY AT HOME OF HER SON BENSON SMITH.

LADY BELOVED BY EVERYONE

Funeral Was Held on Monday and Interment Was Held in Oakland Cemetery at Denison. Many Friends Attend.

Jane Graham was born in North Gower, Ontario, March 1, 1840, on the farm where her father and mother spent all of their married life. Theirs was a christian home and early in life she united with the Wesleyan Methodist church. She was married to Mr. Thomas Smith July 11, 1860, and in 1875 they moved to Crawford county, Iowa, living near Denison for a number of years. To them were born six children, four daughters and one son being born in Canada and one son in Iowa. Mr. Smith died June 24, 1889. Two of her daughters also have preceded their mother to the other world. Mrs. Melissa McCraner dying June 8, 1884, and Mrs. Ann, Elisa Cole, Jan. 3, 1907. December 2, 1891, she was married to Mr. James Schouten, who died the following May. After

tribute of respect to this worthy woman. Interment was made in Oakland cemetery, Denison, Iowa.
