

CATTLE.

Cattle prices continue to advance and with another rise of 25 to 40c this week the market is now all of 60 to 75c higher than it was ten days ago. The advance seems to be the natural result of an improving demand for beef and a decreasing supply of cattle as both local dressed beef men and eastern packers are vigorous competitors of the moderate offerings of fat steers. The best price paid during the week was \$6.90 but a bunch of well finished, long fed, heaves would bring \$7.25 or more. Most of the advance this week is shown on the fair to good 1,000 to 1,300-pound heaves selling around \$5.80 to \$6.40. The short fed and warmed up kinds are going to both killers and feeder buyers around \$4.75 to 5.75. Cows and heifers show fully as much advance as beef grades largely at \$4.00 to 5.25. There was a vigorous demand for stockers and feeders all week and notwithstanding an advance of 25 to 35c in prices the supply has fallen far short of the requirements of the trade and everything has been well cleaned up. All grades and weights find a ready sale.

HOGS.

Another new level has been reached by hogs and the market has been higher than ever before at this point. Although supplies have been tolerably liberal most of the time the offerings have been none too large for the broad demand and values have averaged all of 30 to 40c higher than last week. Weighty loads are still the favorites with all classes of buyers and command a good premium but quality rather than weight determines the price as eastern buyers are keen after good hogs of all weights. The range of prices is not very wide and there is a very strong undertone to the market most of the time. Supplies seem to be increasing in the west but this is more than offset by the increasing demand from eastern butchers. The following table shows the range of prices and average cost of the hogs for the past week:

SHEEP.

With only moderate supplies and a broadening demand from all sources the market for sheep and lambs has been active and stronger from start to finish. Local packers have been vigorous buyers, especially of the heavier muttons, and these show an advance of fully 25 to 35c for the week. On the other hand the inquiry for lambs has not been so strong and the advance in prices on these has not been more than 10 to 15c. Feeder buyers are taking quite a few sheep and lambs out for shearing and feeding purposes and these are selling well up to figures realized for the fat stock.




