

OUTLOOK FOR FEDERAL BUILDING

J. P. CONNER WHO WAS SENT TO WASHINGTON BY COMMERCIAL CLUB RETURNS, FEELING ELATED.

DENISON'S CHANCES IMPROVED

The Case in Hands of Mr. Conner's Old Committee Associates and Congressman F. P. Woods.

J. P. Conner, who sometime since was selected by the Commercial Club to visit Washington to look after the appropriation for a public building for Denison, returned from that city a few days ago bringing a cheerful report of conditions as he found them.

While there he states that he conferred not only with the member of congress from this district, but with most of the members of the committee on public buildings and grounds.

He is pleased to report that the case of Denison is in the hands of his old committee associates, and that we will not be overlooked in case a bill is reported at this session of congress.

It is not absolutely sure that a bill will be reported in view of the fact that a River and Harbor bill carrying \$43,000,000 has passed congress at this session, and there are few precedents for both a River and Harbor bill and a Public Building bill at the same session.

There is however, a movement on foot, to have a small omnibus bill carrying not to exceed \$12,000,000 passed at this session in which case there might be danger of having the amount of the authorization reduced below what we all felt Denison is entitled to.

The indications are that if a bill is not passed at this session there certainly will be one at the next, and with a prospect of an increase of Government receipts, under the new Tariff Law, the chances are the bill will be a substantial one, and in that case the probabilities of our receiving the full amount which we demand would be increased.

The chances of Denison are im-

proved on account of the fact that not a great many other places in Iowa are contesting for Public Buildings as the large number of authorizations during the last few years have provided buildings where needed.

GOOD ROADS DAY.

Fairly Good Attendance of Township Trustees and Supervisors. Col. Baker Talks.

If the well filled court room on Wednesday of last week means there is a revival of interest on the part of farmers for better roads, there is indeed hope ahead along that line. On call of the Board of Supervisors the township officers having in charge road repairs and construction met at the county seat Wednesday, Feb. 23. Supervisor Ahart presided. All the chairs of the spectator's portion of the court room were occupied and the place for the jurymen. Col. W. F. Baker of Council Bluffs was the first speaker. He spoke for over an hour pleading for the construction of hard dirt roads and the use of the road drag to keep them in condition. He is an enthusiast along the line of wide tires on the wagons. He was followed by Prof. Thor. H. McDonald of Ames college, who is president of the Iowa Highway Association. He spoke as a civil engineer. Of course he said at once that the secret of good roads was good drainage. He explained that the laws of Iowa provided for hiring farmers to drag the roads in front of their own land. The pay could be fifty cents a mile for each mile dragged. So up the road, and back again would earn one dollar. It is to be hoped that the meeting will bear great fruits for Crawford county.

Hon. C. M. Harl of Council Bluffs, Iowa, a prominent lawyer and President of the State Bar Association, died at his home in that city on Tuesday. On Monday morning he was stricken with paralysis and did not recover consciousness prior to his death. Mr. Harl was not only prominent in his profession, but was a conspicuous character in the politics of the state.

On Thursday, Feb. 17th occurred the death of Wm. B. Smith, formerly a resident of Denison, in the hospital at Los Angeles, California.

He was first taken down with pneumonia at the home of his daughter Mrs. Beckman, where he and his wife and family were visiting. Later blood poisoning set in and he was removed to the hospital in order to have an operation performed, but this was abandoned and in twenty-four hours he was dead.

William Smith was born in Charlestown, N. Y., in the year 1845, and came west when twenty-three years of age, and located at Clinton Iowa. Here he was married to Francisella Conover and settled on a farm near Low Moor, where he lived for a number of years. Later he moved with his family to Denison, and remained here until 1905 when he and his wife and youngest daughter moved to North Dakota to visit his married daughter, Mrs. Whipkey. The next year they went to California where another married daughter, Mrs. Jensen Beckman, resides.

Mr. Smith was a man of strong convictions and firm in his principles of christian living, and for many years was identified with the Baptist church. While living in Denison he and his wife passed through many trying experiences, six of their children being taken from them by death. This great trial proved the Christian fortitude of the man who, through it all, remained a firm believer in his Savior.

After that date the patrons will have the expense of one phone where heretofore they had the expense of two. We predict that the new arrangement will prove popular and the service quite as satisfactory as in the past.




