Whereas: At the regular September 1909 session of the Board of Supervisors of Crawford County, Iowa, a petition signed by E. W. O'Banion et al, land owners, representing that a large tract or body of land lying along in the vicinity of about two miles on either side of the Boyer river is subject to overflow and too wet for cultivation and that the public benefit, utility, the public health convenience and welfare will be promoted by draining and ditching the same, and changing the natural water courses of the Boyer river, beginning at a point at or near the north line of Union Township, and ending at a point in Boyer Township, so as to empty into the Harrison County ditch, and the said petitioners filed with the county auditor a bond conditioned as required by law, which said bond was approved by the said county auditor, and requested that the board appoint a competent engineer to make a survey and report of said proposed ditch and report his findings therein whether the prayer of the petition be granted or rejected, and at the said September session of the board Morris McHenry was duly appointed the engineer and instructed to survey said route as nearly as practicable as set forth in said petition and to report at the November session 1909, of said board, and on date for said report, the engineer not being able to complete said survey the time for report was extended to January session 1910, and on the 14th day of February 1910, it being an adjourned meeting of January session of the Board the said engineer makes his report in writing recommending the establishment of a drainage district as prayed by said petition, and that the proposed improvement be made, and it appearing by said report, and return of the engineer, that it sets forth the starting point, the route, and terminus of said ditch and improvement, together with a plat and profile showing the ditch and improvement, together with a plat and profile showing the ditch, and the course and length of the drain through each tract of land and the elevation of all ponds and deep depressions in said district, so as to include therein all lands that will be benefited by the proposed improvement and the boundary of the proposed district, and the description of each tract of land therein and the name of the owners thereof as shown by the transfer books in the auditor's office, together with the probable cost, and the board finds, that all the requirements of the law in reference to said improvement have been complied with.
