LAUB ELECTED FOR MAYOR

HAS 130 MAJORITY. HIS ELECTION A PERSONAL AND POLITICAL TRIUMPH. REPUBLICANS STAND BY HIM.

COUNCIL IS STILL REPUBLICAN

Charley French, in the Third Ward, a Regular Cyclone, and Wins Hands Down Over His Opponent Atzen.

At the city election on Monday, W. H. Laub was elected mayor over O. M. Criswell; C. L. Voss treasurer, over W. A. Lamborn; H. A. Norman assessor over R. S. Cassaday; Chas. Christensen and J. T. Haugh aldermen-at-large over James Armstrong and Herman Grill. In the first ward A. C. Greene was elected alderman over S. McCullough; in the second ward P. J. Eggers over W. H. Gibson; in the third ward C. R. French over Peter Atzen. Mr. Laub's election to the office of mayor was a personal and political triumph. The Republicans who so generously supported him at the caucus did not desert him at the election. The Republicans of the city are to be congratulated for standing almost solidly for the ticket. Chas. Christensen, candidate for alderman-at-large, won a signal victory. James Armstrong, his colleague on the ticket, did not fare so well, although he made a splendid showing. The Republicans made a mistake at their caucus in selecting both candidates for aldermen-at-large from the same ward. This fact may have caused Mr. Armstrong his defeat. The voters threw their strength to Christensen and Haugh, with the result that Armstrong and Grill were left in the minority.

C. L. Voss, for treasurer, demonstrated his popularity by the large vote he received, being second only to the vote cast for Laub for mayor. H. A. Norman received the third highest vote. Arthur Greene, in the first ward, was invincible, running ahead of his ticket. Charles French, in the third ward, ran like a cyclone, and easily won out over Peter Atzen, who was so sure of election. Will Gibson fell by the wayside, but made a good showing in view of the ward being democratic and his short residence in the precinct. The election was a decided Republican victory, and they will be in control of the affairs of the city. The secret of the success of the Republicans was the fact that they stood by the caucus nominations, which will always insure Republican victory in Denison. The Harrison county board of supervisors have adopted plans for their new \$100,000 court house and have employed J. E. Mill of Detroit to supervise the work.

County Supt. Hoffman informs us that the supply of rural teachers is five short for the spring term, and unless they are able to get some teachers from out of the county, some schools will be without teachers. Twenty of the teachers who taught during the winter term will not teach this spring on account of getting better paying employment. Crawford county will have to raise the salaries of the schoolma'ams if they want to keep them.

Tuesday morning the two-year old son of Mr. and Mrs. Lee Winn of Buck Grove, while playing in the house, accidentally got hold of some rat poison and before his parents discovered it, had eaten a quantity of it. The father immediately telephoned to Denison for a doctor, and by the use of antidotes the child was pulled through. It was, however, a close call, and they were very fortunate in securing medical aid in time to save the child's life.

Scholars Get County Diplomas

DISTRICT COURT IN SESSION

MARCH TERM OF DISTRICT COURT CONVENED MONDAY AFTERNOON. GRAND JURY IMPANELLED.

JUDGE CHURCH IS PRESIDING

Calendar Called and a Large Number of Cases Continued For Service And Other Causes.

The March term of the district court convened on Monday last, Judge Church presiding. The calendar was immediately called and the grand jury impanelled. Following are the members of the grand jury: N. P. Larson, Thos. Carey, John Jurgensen, J. M. Peters, Peter Meggers, W. F. Switzer, and C. W. White. Mr. Larson was sworn as foreman of the jury and J. L. Ainsworth is clerk. A large number of cases were continued for service and other causes, some of them with the suggestions of the court that they would be stricken from the calendar next term if not otherwise disposed of. In the case of the Hamilton National Bank of Chicago vs Nicholson, et al, tried at a former term of this court the motion for new trial was overruled and exceptions taken. The case will be appealed. In the case of C. Thompson vs Farmers' State Bank the demurrer was overruled which will probably result in a judgment for the plaintiff. The trial of the contest over the will of John Thies, deceased, was set for Monday of next week, being the first jury trial, and the Snellbaker will case is to follow on Tuesday. The case of H. A. Tinker vs Farmers' State Bank was set for trial on Friday of this week. On the criminal docket the case of the State of Iowa vs Mrs. Thos. Wheelwright was dismissed by the County Attorney. In the case of the State of Iowa vs Sherman Blakely, the bond to keep the peace was made permanent. In the case of the State of Iowa vs L. G. 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EASTER SERVICES AT THE CHURCHES

APPROPRIATE SERVICES HELD IN ALL THE CHURCHES IN DENISON. LARGE AUDIENCES PRESENT.

BEAUTIFUL FLOWERS AND PLANTS

Special Music Rendered, and Programs Fitting the Occasion Carried Out. Easter Offerings as Usual. Perfect Day.

Easter Sunday was one of the most beautiful days we had this spring and resulted in bringing out large crowds of people to attend the Easter services held at the several churches of the city. Programs appropriate to the day were carried out. The following are the reports of the exercises of the several churches:

Catholic Church.
At the Catholic church the services were of a very high order. The fine weather brought out large crowds, hundreds of whom received Holy Communion. The parishioners brought flowers in abundance. The Sisters of St. Frances decorated the altars on a scale of magnificence, seldom seen in country churches, and Rev. Father Farrelly delivered an eloquent sermon at each service on "Easter, the Greatest of Christian Feasts." The music at the eight o'clock service consisted of the hymns, "The Dawn Was Purpling O'er the Sky," "I Need Thee, Heart of Jesus," "Alleluia, Alleluia, Let the Holy Anthem Rise," and a beautiful violin selection by John O'Connor and Josie Kinney, with organ accompaniment by Mary Lally. At the ten-thirty service the full choir rendered, "Feast's Mass" all through, a composition that beautifully interprets the Easter sentiment of all Christian people. A violin solo, "The Holy City" was presented by Miss Margaret Clarke to the delight of all.

Methodist Church.
On Easter morning the auditorium of the church was made bright with beautiful flowers and potted plants, and the choir under the leadership of Mr. B. J. Sibbert, gave special music, suitable for the occasion. The leading anthem was the chorus, "Lift Up Your Heads," from "The Easter King." The choir, full twenty-five

strong, gave this great selection in a manner which won for it much praise. The morning sermon was suitable to the occasion and dwelt upon the words of greeting given by Jesus to Mary in the garden and to the Disciples when He met them in the upper room. At the Sunday School hour, the children were given an opportunity to make an Easter offering for the cause of Missions, and this was very liberally responded to. The evening service was given up to the children and their celebration of the glad day. The Superintendent, Prof. Van Ness, made use of his lantern and a screen in presenting the scenes of the Resurrection of Jesus. The pastor, Rev. Sensey, read appropriate selections from the Bible as the views were presented. The children of the primary department, under the instruction of Mrs. Voss, Miss Straban and Miss Scriber, sang and gave recitations, showing in all that they had been well drilled. There were also exercises by the children of the intermediate department. The services were all attended by an unusually large number of people. It was a glad day for the Methodist people.

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ESTABLISH THE DITCH

BOARD OF SUPERVISORS CONCLUDE TO ESTABLISH BOYER DITCH. PASS RESOLUTION.

THE APPRAISERS ARE APPOINTED

Something Over Eleven Miles of Ditch to be Built. Will Save Much Valuable Farming Land.

The Board of Supervisors, while in session on the 24th of March, considered what course it should adopt respecting the protests filed against the establishment of the ditch to straighten the Boyer river, beginning with the west line of Denison township and extending to the Harrison county line, a distance of slightly over eleven miles, and after having taken evidence as to the conditions prompting the improvement, and viewing the line itself, decided that there were sufficient reasons to warrant it in establishing the ditch, and passed a resolution to this effect. The Auditor has appointed a committee, consisting of J. S. Wattles, Thos. McGrin and Peter Atzen, to assess the damages claimed by several parties who have filed claims for damages with the County Auditor. These appraisers will have nothing whatever to do with the question of fixing the amount which the several tracts of land affected by the improvement, shall bear toward the expense of the improvement. This will be left to another board of appraisers to be appointed hereafter. The appraisers which have been appointed will deal entirely with the damages which the property will sustain by reason of the location of the proposed improvement. After the appraisers have made their report, the claimant, will have the privilege of accepting the amount allowed by the board of supervisors or appealing to the district court.

Baptist Church.
Here, as at the other churches, a large audience was in attendance at the morning services. The subject of the discourse by the pastor was, "Jesus and the Resurrection," special emphasis being put upon the place and importance given to the doctrine of the Resurrection by the Apostolic and early teachers of the church. Special music was rendered by the choir. Also a solo by Mrs. Martin. At the Sunday evening service, a special program of sermon and song, entitled "The Message of the Cross," was given. This was a most unique and impressive service, and was carefully followed by the large audience.

Presbyterian Church.
During the Sunday School hour a portion of the Easter service was held and beautiful songs were rendered. It was a record breaking day with the largest attendance of the year. The Easter sermon was delivered in the evening, the subject being, "Immortality."

Episcopal Church.
The ten-thirty service was omitted on account of Rev. Corbitt not being able to reach the city in time for the service. The children's service was at nine thirty and was well attended.
