COMMERCIAL CLUB BOOMS GOOD ROADS

PROPOSES "RIVER TO RIVER" DRAGGED
ROADS THROUGH RICHEST
IOWA.

OTHER CITIES JOIN MOVEMENT

Committee Pushes the Matter and Already
Several Enthusiastic Responses Are
Received.

The movement of a second "river to river" dragged road, following the general course of the Chicago & Northwestern from Council Bluffs to Clinton was inaugurated by the Denison Commercial Club at its meeting on Friday evening. W. C. Rollins, Dr. B. F. Philbrook and F. W. Meyers were appointed as a committee and they got to work at once sending letters to the Mayors, and to other prominent citizens of the cities along the proposed route.

The plan submitted is for a permanent good roads association not only to secure a good road across the state but to maintain it. It is proposed that a general meeting be held in the center of the state and as many as possible of those interested are urged to attend by auto thus forming two great processions across the state to preach the gospel of good roads and to create as much enthusiasm as possible.

F. G. Pierce, Secretary of the League of Iowa Municipalities, writes that the Denison plan would be taken up at a banquet of the Marshalltown Commercial Club on Tuesday evening.

Ira Kemkes, Secretary of the Nevada Commercial Club closes an enthusiastic letter as follows:

"In short wish to say that Nevada wishes to be considered as one of the cities most heartily in favor of the move, and would be pleased to hear further from you gentlemen regarding the progress of the proposition."

Mayor F. L. Anderson of Marion tells of the good roads of that vicinity and says, "your plan would meet with hearty co-operation and support by the people of Marion and vicinity. A number of our citizens would be

glad to meet as committeemen at any point in Iowa." Marion has named a committee to work with the Denison committee and suggests Cedar Rapids as the place for a general meeting.

Mayor D. E. Waldron of Gildien writes that the people of his city are in favor of the movement and want the organization to be made permanent. A committee will be appointed later to work with the other cities.

As the letters were mailed Monday evening the Denison committee feels much encouraged by the tone and the promptness of the replies at hand and feels that by the end of the week nearly every town along the line will be heard from and that the movement will be well under way.

CEMETERY MEETING POSTPONED

CONTRACTOR NORTHAM INJURED

Part of Well Curb Gives Way and Falls Fourteen Feet Carrying Northam With It. A Narrow Escape.

In the prosecution of the work of sinking the city wells, an accident occurred two or three days ago, which resulted in W. J. Northam, the contractor, receiving quite a severe injury. It was while lowering a fourteen foot curb in one of the new wells that it caught on the side, and while making an effort to loosen it, it suddenly dropped about sixteen feet to the bottom of the well, carrying Mr. Northam with it, and throwing him with such force as to injure one of his limbs severely. One of the other parties who was assisting in the work, narrowly escaped being carried down, and was only saved by one of his co-workers catching him and pulling him back. It is fortunate for Mr. Northam and the other parties that no more serious consequences resulted. It is expected the wells will all be dug before the end of this week, and that they will furnish an inexhaustible supply of water.

Edict Denounced

Edict is the name of one of the McHenry thoroughbred bulls, recently sold to a party who intends to ship him to Nebraska and in order to have him inspected before shipping, he was last Wednesday loaded into one of the large stock wagons at the McHenry ranch for the purpose of taking him to Dr. Simpson's hospital where the test could be made. When the wagon reached a point between the Nelson harness shop and the Court House yard, his lordship concluded to revolt by smashing the wagon and making every attempt to escape his prison. Just what prompted him to an act of rebellion, it is difficult to say, whether the fact that he was to be sent out of the State or that he was to be taken to Dr. Simpson for treatment, but anyway he demonstrated his ability to direct his own affairs, and compelled the manager to return to the McHenry farm without being inspected.

CUSHMAN WINS CASE

Sues D. C. Thew for Land Commission and Gets Verdict for \$240. Court Will Adjourn This Week.

The district court is still in session and will not adjourn before the latter part of the week. There have been but few cases of importance tried either to the court or to the jury. On Monday the case of W. W. Cushman vs D. C. Thew came on for trial before the jury. This case is one brought by Mr. Cushman against Mr. Thew to recover a commission for finding a purchaser for Mr. Thew's farm south of town last fall. The trial was a spirited one and was submitted to the jury about five o'clock Tuesday afternoon, and within an hour a verdict was returned in favor of Mr. Cushman for \$240, the full amount claimed by him.

The cases of A. Alexander and Fred A. Maurer against the Milwaukee Railway Co. were consolidated to be tried as one case, and after their consolidation, on petition of the Railway Co., the cases were transferred to the Federal Court for trial. These are cases brought by Mr. Alexander and Mr. Maurer to recover damages for loss of crops on account of the overflow of the Boyer river, caused as they claim, by the fault of the Railway Co.

Two or three divorce cases have been disposed of this week, and divorces granted in each case. A number of cases have been dismissed and perhaps a larger number continued over until next term.

COMMERCIAL CLUB WILL TAKE CITY CENSUS
TUESDAY APRIL 21ST. ENUMERATORS
WILL BE APPOINTED TO-MORROW.

LET EVERY CITIZEN ASSIST

An Enumerator Will be Appointed for Each City Block and Work Will be Done in one Day. Matter Important to Denison.

Thursday, April 21st, will be Census Day for Denison. A committee appointed by the Commercial Club is hard at work on the plans for taking the complete census of the city in a few hours. An enumerator will be appointed for each city block so that the work will be light for each man and he will have only a small section with which he is personally acquainted.

It is recognized that for the next ten years Denison will be rated far and near by the result of the present National census. It is the purpose of the Commercial Club to take a separate, independent census of the names to be turned over to the official enumerators to assist them in their work and to make as sure as possible that no resident is missed from the roll.

The one block to a man system is the one followed by many cities and all that is needed is a little co-operation on the part of the citizens. Thursday afternoon is the day selected and every household is asked to be ready to give the desired information.

No impertinent questions will be asked. All the club wishes is the names, sex and whether the individual is a child or an adult. Especial attention should be given to see that those temporarily absent are enrolled and that all single men and women who are boarding or who are employed in the various homes be not overlooked.

Tomorrow evening the census committee consisting of A. Wright, J. T. Carey, R. A. Norris, G. L. Caswell and F. W. Meyers will appoint the enumerators, each person thus chosen will be forwarded necessary blanks for the work and complete instructions. Those appointed are requested to leave






