 The inventor of the Linotype was Ottmar Mergenthaler, a German clock maker. It has been stated many times that Ottmar Mergenthaler died in poverty, while others reaped the reward of his genius; but this is not a fact, as Ottmar Mergenthaler died a millionaire, in 1899, and his family royalties have never been less than \$50,000 a year since that time. Ottmar Mergenthaler was a genius, and every Linotype man glories in it. He created one of the wonders of the world. The Linotype today is far different from what it was when Ottmar Mergenthaler invented it, and for its advance we are indebted largely to the genius of our president, Philip T. Dodge, and the head of our Experimental Department, John R. Rogers.
